EREDERICTON, Feb. 22nd. MESSRS. EDITORS,-The debate on Railway Committee still continues at intervals. There have been, in the mean time, a number of Bills passed the House, chiefly of a local nature, The lamentations of Mr. Wilmot and his friends have been fully met; and it has been clearly proved that the late Government were equally responsible with the present, for the Railway expenditure, as the Contract had not been taken off Jackson's hands when the late administration usurped the Government of the Country, that the acts of the Legislature empowering the Government to take possession of the works, had not yet gone across the Atlantic; and the first shilling was expended, and first sod turned, by the late Government.

The whinings of Messrs End and McIntosh about over-riding the Law, by not expending £50,000 above Fredericton, and the same amount toward Miramichi, has also been silenced by the Law itself, which authorizes the Government, to suspend the work, or any part thereof, whenever

the service demanded it. Mr. Hannington said he had lived to see a great many schemes propounded for the building of Railroads, and for himself he had opposed the building of them by the Government, but after all he had learned a fact which the country had for a long time lost sight of; and that was if we ever expect to have reilroads, we must pay for them, and this was the first scheme of the kind ever introduced to the Legislature, and the present Government deserved the credit for it; and he said there was another remarkable fact which he would mention, and that was, if the Railroad should turn out a popular and paying speculation, we would not have honourable members disowning their offspring, but endeavour to prove their legitimate parentage. A Bill has been introduced by Mr. End to abolish property qualifications for candidates to the House of Assembly.


