EUROPEAN NEWS.

From our London Correspondent.

LONDON, Dec. 16th, 1859. Yesterday Parliament was prorogued to the 24th of January, then "to meet for the despatch of divers urgent and important business"-the formula which antiquity has prescribed for fixing the date of legislatorial recall to St. Stephens and public business. It would be useless to give you a list of the speakers who have talked politics at local meetings; few gatherings of importance have been held; and the most interesting item on that head has respect to the decision of the Parliamentary Reform Association, with which Mr. Bright is leagued, to support the Government Reform Bill, if it proposes a £8 franchise, i. e., a vote to all persons hiring in boroughs, tenements rented to the poor on a rental of £6 or upwards. That Association will not, however, consider such a Bill as final, but will press on to gain a more liberal franchise, with other parts of the Radical programme.

The Rifle Volunteer movement is spreading over the island, and the War Office has appointed a Commission to decide on the kind of uniform to be adopted. In some places funds have been raised to pay for the equipment of volunteers unable to purchase a uniform for themselves.

Nor is rifleshooting the only martial feature of the day. Ships of war are being built and fitted up with amazing expedition; and experiments in advance are proceeding without intermission, Some practice with the Armstrong gun yesterday showed that at 1700 yards the target could be struck without fail; and we are daily hearing of guns and machines more formidable than the Armstrong weapon of war. Napoleon, if he ever seriously thought of an invasion, will have repented of the scheme, and the French would require to get into a very different mood before they would display much ability at crossing the Channel and making a descent. It would be a bolder descent than it is possible for human nature, even French nature, to entertain without a shudder. At such risks the most quarrelsome General would rather not attempt in propria p.r. sona to revenge the detested Waterloo!

The Irish Roman Catholic Bishops are very busy getting up demonstrations of sympathy with the Pope against His Holiness' naughty subjects, who would rather have some other ruler. The Irish sympathisers confine their condolences to the deepest expressions, and neither by gifts or other tangible means do they evince their attachment to the Supreme Pontiff. Some of the manifestations have been so disrespectful to the Queen, and most of them so ungrateful for the civil and religious liberty conferred by the Emancipation Act of 1829, that moderate Roman Catholics are getting alarmed at the reactionary effect which their silly exhibitions are likely to produce. Italy is fertile, and if a Protestant Government is so tyrannical and a Popish one so delectable, why not flee from the one and flee to the other? Victoria can spare them, and Pio Nono needs them to console his heart and fight his battles.

Judges (Crowder) has led to the appointment in his place of Sir H. Keating, the Solicitor General, whose vacant place is supplied by W. Atherton, Q. C., a son of the late Rev. Wm. Atherton, Wesleyan Minister, and an ex-President of Conference. You will also have heard of the death of W. DeQuincey, almost simultaneously with that of Washington Irving. , If the latter was the more graceful and entertaining writer, the former was one of the most versatile, subtle, learned and ornate which England ever produced. He reminded one of those Eastern swords which possess the keenest edge and finest temper, while the hilt is studded with precious stones, and the weapon is figured over with the most curious devices. When he was a boy at school his master said that he could address an Athenian audience better than he (the master) could address an English one. There is something apocryphallooking in the tales of his Greek acquisitions, but of the range and brilliancy of his powers no question can be raised. Concerning his disposition much is said in censure, and in this respect Washington Irving undoubtedly as far excelled as in the intellectual region he fell below him.

The St. Georges-in-the-East conflict has not ceased; but yesterday it was announced that the Rector was willing to hold out the olive branch. Whether it is imitation or the reality time will prove. He may be sincere, as the Rev. Hugh Allen, whose afternoon lectureship commenced the struggle, has been appointed to the Rectorship of St. George's, Southwark, a post of some eminence and much labour. His retirement from the field may allow of commissions from the other side, and so this scandal be abated.

The Bishops and their friends have resolved on a determined opposition to the Anti-church rate measure, which passed the House of Commons this year, and will be revived next session. Church Rates are to be defended as the outpost of the Establishment, nay, as one of its surest bulwarks. Church Rates may, of course, be defended, but the defence can be grounded only on principles which would logically justify persecution, and which have lost their hold upon the present age. The Church of England is not strong on the State-Church principle, but for traditional and sentimental reasons which have no bearing on church rates and all its irritating
