

SCHILLER. GOETHE, LEE, BYRON, HUME, BURNS THURLOW, AND CHESTERFIELD.

The annals of letters scarcely present such an ovasion to genius, as has of late been accorded to Schiller, by Europe and America. The splendid procession in 1791, when the ashes of Voltarie were removed to the Pantheon. nor the still more classic one at Alexandria, when Ptolemy Philadelphus was crowned ; can not vie with the honor paid by the Old and New World to the poet of Germany. These glowing descriptions, with which the papers for months have teemed, have led the writer to examine their interior histories. And the sad impression is constantly made, that honor and pleasure, without a gospel hope, are a sad inhertitance. What avails it, that the ashes be pressed with marble, and poets sing to our memory, if indeed, there be no well-grounded hope in our death ?

Is it not a mockery of the death, to write upon their tombstones an epitaph, full, of promise to the slumberer,-if, while living, he rejected the truth, by which alone Peace* can be secured ? While residing in the capital of the Duchy of Baden, Schiller thus unbosoms his utter desolation of heart to his life-long friend Theo. Koener : " Men, things, climate, and, place, have all lost their attractions for me. There is not a soul here. (Mamheim, pop. 25,000), no, not one sonl, capable of filling up the void in my heart. I never yet was happy. Weep for me, n his mother's bosom, and said, "Mother, I do within charmed circle of death, by engaging in that I should make such a confession. I look upon Manheim as a prison, and its atmosphere weighs upon me like the conscience of a murderer." His biographer is our authority for the fact, that the following lines were a transcript of "Oh Mother, may I go skating, it is so nice-Ed the mind of this genius :--

" Let me weep

Upon thy bosom let me weep hot tears, Thou only friend. I have no one no one On this wide earth ,--no one, Far as our flag is honored :--- not a spot, Not one, not one, where I may weep."

As he neared the tomb, his last written allusuion to his future has nothing to relieve the gloom of that mind, which had amused so many. He quotes Montesquieu, as sanctioning suicide; " Every man may conclude the Fifth Act of his Tragedy whenever he thinks best." He then sportively alludes to those who had put an end to their mental misery from the days of Ajax to Otho.
