He makes many allusions to them, and even took them up in his arms and blessed them, and in the first gospel sermon ever preached Peter says, "The promise is unto you and to your children," &c. A man attempts to build a house, he is a long time collecting materials and a long time building. The Jewish Temple was 46 years in building, and other buildings even a longer space of time, but God made this world and all its furniture in the space of six days: Verily He is one who should be remembered. One reason why you should remember your Creater in the days of your youth, is, that impressions made on the young mind are not easily effaced-they are more permanent and lasting than in riper years. I am of opinion that there are very few converted over thirty years of age; how necessary then to seek God in youth before the follies and glitter of the world and its amusements and pleasures, have taken away the desire for better things. 2d Another reason why you should remember your Creator in the days of your youth is, that many children die young. If you go into the cemetery this coming week, you will see there many small graves, and among them, one in memory of little "Jane," aged eight years: she was a sweet child, kind, loving, and obedient to her parents. Whenever there was Sunday School she was there, always in her place. What a comfort she was to all. How every body who knew her, loved her. But she was taken ill; her mother wept sore, and her father prayed that if it was God's will their little one might be spared. But God willed that Jane should die. Little Jane died, and kind friends wrapped her in her shroud, and put her in the coffin, and then they carried her away to the cemetery, and placed her in the grave-"dust to dust," and there beneath that stone lies little Jane, eight years old. There is another stone there, a larger and perhaps handsomer one, to the memory of James, aged 12 years. James was a lovely boy, intelligent and obliging, winning for himself the good will and esteem of all around; but death seized him for its prey.
