

decides the fate of parties. The Protestants of Hunter Grove were determined to elect a man who would support Mr. Hoyle's government. They are a decided majority of the population, and felt that it would be weak and wicked on their part to succumb to Polish brute force. Prendergrast is the nominee of the mob. His opponents were Messrs. Haywood and Moore. Nomination day passed quietly. But—

"One party, residents of Bear's Cove, when on their way home, were furiously set upon by an overwhelming force of Prendergrast's mob, armed with stones, bludgeons, and other deadly weapons and, being few in number, were driven back into the town. It was during this treacherous and cowardly attack that John Munn, Esq., one of our most esteemed merchants, who was quietly talking with a friend in the street, was struck down by a ruffian armed with a loaded stick and severely injured. Meantime, a small party of Protestants, who mustered hastily, being assailed by showers of stones, turned on this band of scoundrels and speedily chased them out of the town. By this time the military were called out; and the Protestant party being assured that the peace of the town would now be preserved by its proper guardians, they were requested to disperse, retired peacefully. While they were in the act of doing so, the mob, reinforced by four hundred of the deepest-dyed ruffians in the country, fresh from Carbonear, set upon them, in the most furious manner, with sticks and stones; but though far outnumbering the others they were soon repulsed. The military now intervened themselves between the two parties; and Mr. Pinsent, Stipendiary Magistrate, urged all parties to retire to their homes. The Protestants at once obeyed the representative of law; flung down whatever weapons they had hastily snatched to defend their lives, and began to retire homeward. The moment their enemies were unarméd and dispersed, they rushed past the military, who were now commanded to prevent them, and again attacked the Protestants, now scattered and without any defensive weapons, with savage fury; the soldiers, headed by the Magistrate and Captain Hanrahan, calmly looking on. The betrayed Protestants were now compelled to fly and shelter themselves as best they could. The mob took possession of the town, and the military gallantly escorted them through it. The scene of destruction commenced, amid yells and execrations worthy of fiends."

Then follow details of the destruction done by the mob—houses gutted, stores robbed—windows smashed—gates and fences torn down. An attempt was made to murder Prendergrast's opponents, in their own houses but they were providentially rescued.

"Having completely wrecked all the houses of Protestants in the main street and other localities, the Carbonear tigers went home and a full took place. Next day (Saturday) they returned in huge force; no Protestant dared appear out of doors; the most awful threats were uttered against all Protestants; the yells and imprecations were frightful in the extreme. In the darkness of the night Protestant women and children were flying for shelter, some to the court house and barracks where the military were stationed and others wherever they could find protection. The state of the town cannot be described. If a foreign enemy had got possession of it, it and its inhabitants would have been treated scarcely have been worse. The stores of merchants were entirely at the mercy of an infuriated mob. On Sunday, we learn that the same reign of terror continued, but particulars have not yet reached us. The house of the Rev. Mr. Lockhart, Wesleyan Minister, was completely riddled with stones; and he and his family had to take refuge in the court house.

The British Bishop of Hunter Grove and the Priests did not interfere in the least to check the disturbance—to save life or property. In fact, it is more than suspected that the proceedings of the mob met their approval.

When the British majority found out that the new Government had a majority in the Legislature they had the assurance to resolve that the House should not be permitted to assemble. Monday last was the day for opening parliament, but the St. John's mob—under the wing and leadership of A. Kent and Bishop Mullock—raised such a riot that it was impossible for the Governor to discharge his duty or for the House to meet. Mob law reigned supreme. In this emergency the Governor telegraphed for troops to Halifax, and on Wednesday last two hundred men of the 62nd regiment, under command of Col. Fordyce, proceeded to St. John's in the *Delta*.

The "Colonial Empire" says:—

"One account from St. John's says that these troops were not allowed to land; another account says, that having landed, they were unable to cope with the rabble. In consequence, H. M. Steamer "Hydra" was de-patched from Halifax last Saturday afternoon with three officers and 80 soldiers, and under the heavy guns of this vessel, and nearly 300 soldiers, order will probably be restored right speedily.

United States.

Civil war in the United (?) States has been fairly inaugurated. The bombardment of Fort Sumpter, and the surrender of that Fort to the Secessionists, may be considered the first blow. The events of last week leave, we think, no room to doubt but that a fierce and sanguinary conflict will take place between the North and South; many valuable lives will be sacrificed, and millions of pounds worth of property be destroyed. On Thursday night the city of Alexandria in Virginia, was captured by the Federal troops, 7,000 in number; the inhabitants received notice to quit the city in six hours, and a subsequent despatch states that Alexandria was in flames. During the capture of the city, Col. Elsworth, leader of a regiment called the Fire Zouaves, made up we believe from the fire department of New York—was shot dead by the proprietor of a Hotel, the Secession flag on which he pulled down. The Hotel keeper was immediately caught and cut to pieces by the Zouaves. The death of Elsworth caused intense excitement at the North; his remains were sent to New York for interment. Federal troops have been advancing toward Norfolk in Virginia, and reports from the South say that General Beauregard was also marching to that place, where a pitched battle is anticipated. Arlington Heights, opposite Washington, Alexandria in Virginia, and the Hill of the Potomac for 10 or 15 miles below Washington are occupied by Federal troops. The forces now said to be under arms by the respective parties are, Federal 260,000, Rebels 150,000. The following are the latest despatches of importance:—

Boston, 27th, 3.30.—The banks of the Potomac on the Virginia side are being fortified for several miles below Washington.

There has been some skirmishing between the different outposts, and in one case six rebel officers were captured.

It is reported that a strong Federal army will advance on Richmond.

The New York Herald states that the Sewall's Point Battery has been taken by General Butler and Commodore Stringham, with a loss on the side of the Federal army of 85 men. 385 of the Virginians were killed, when the battery surren-

dered to Gen. Butler, with 13 cannon and 600 prisoners. This report is not yet confirmed.

By Telegraph to News Room.

Boston, May 28.

Reports from Virginia state that Beauregard is preparing to march on Alexandria, where Federal troops are fortifying themselves.

The rebels are concentrating a large army in the vicinity of Richmond.

Despatches to the New York Times state that it is the intention of the Federal Government to crush out the rebellion before the coming 4th of July.

Simultaneous attacks will be made on Norfolk, Richmond, Harper's Ferry and Pensacola, and a flotilla will be sent down the Mississippi River. Loyal citizens will be protected, but traitors will be hung and their property confiscated.

It is proposed to put 300,000 Federal troops at once into the field.

Boston, May 29.

Movements of Federal troops indicate an attack on Harper's Ferry soon.

There are 10,000 troops at Fort Monroe. Point Newport, mouth of James River, taken possession of by 25,000 Federal troops.

Great excitement at Norfolk, many citizens leaving.

Blockade of Southern ports will be complete within 15 days.

One hundred thousand more Federal troops will be called out.

A large force of Ohio troops have entered Virginia from the West, and occupy Parkinsburg and Grafton, the rebels are in haste.

A full number of rebels have protection of Federal troops, and are held, as contraband of war, and set to work on fortifications.

English News.

The Steamship "Atna" arrived at Cape Race on Thursday at 9.30 P.M.

The British Government has issued a proclamation declaring its intention to maintain the strictest neutrality between the Government of the United States and certain States styling themselves the Confederate States of America.

It warns British subjects that if they enter military service on either side, or join ships of war or transports, or attempt to recruit, or fit out vessels for war purposes or transports, or break or endeavor to break any blockade lawfully or actually established, or to carry soldiers' dispatch, or any material contraband of war for either party, they will be liable to all the penalties, and consequences, and will do so at their peril, and in no wise obtain protection from Government.

The Jamaica Cotton Growing Company had determined to plant several thousand acres in that island forthwith, so that the crop can be in Manchester before the end of the year.

MARRIAGE OF ANOTHER PRINCESS.—Arrangements have been made for the marriage of the Princess Alice, the Queen's second daughter, to Prince Louis of Hesse, Germany. It is said that this marriage is not one of state interest, but based on the mutual affections of the pair.

The following testimony to the excellent qualities of the young Princess by Lord Palmerston and Mr. Disraeli, on the occasion of the former announcing the intended event, to the House of Commons, and asking for a provision for her—

is most flattering, and reflects additional honor on her Royal Mother:—

"Those who have had the good fortune to be allowed to approach her Royal Highness, the Princess Alice, know by their personal observation, that she inherits all those eminent qualities of heart and head which so greatly distinguish her illustrious parents; (cheers) and the testimony which I may say those favored persons have borne as to the result of their observation has, I am persuaded, spread wide over the land a conviction that this is a faithful representation of the case. (Cheers) Her Royal Highness has the good fortune of having made choice of a Prince who, I am persuaded, will prove in every respect worthy of her choice, and the strength of their mutual attachment affords the strongest expectation that in their future life they will enjoy that same domestic happiness of which her Royal Highness has seen such a model under her maternal roof (cheers), which has soothed and mitigated the cares and anxieties of sovereign power, and served as an example and an object of admiration to the whole British nation. (Loud cheers) There is another topic which under the circumstances, may recommend this address to the House. This House and the nation take a deep interest in everything which concerns the feelings and the comfort of Her Majesty (cheers) and they cannot, I think, but view with great satisfaction the announcement of an event which tends to direct Her Majesty's thoughts to anticipations of joy and happiness in the future, and which may gently withdraw her mind from dwelling with too great an intensity on the more melancholy recollections of the past. (Cheers.)"

Mr. Disraeli.—Sir, the announcement made in the Royal Message is one which I am sure has given great satisfaction to the House. Any event which so deeply concerns the domestic happiness of Her Majesty must be to us always a source of great satisfaction; and I am quite sure that when the occasion arrives this House will be prepared in a becoming spirit properly to consider the subject which has been recommended to our attention by Her Majesty. Sir, I am quite sure that on this occasion, especially the interest which the House takes in the domestic happiness of Her Majesty must be increased when we remember that it relates to the accomplished Princess whose good fortune it will be in another land to represent in a matter gratifying to all Englishmen the character of her Country. (Cheers.) That lady, as is well known to many, and by her private conduct to many, to the country generally, and to this House—has already shown a disposition so eminent for its good qualities, and an intelligence so bright and winning, that I am sure it will not be a mere formal ceremony on the part of the House of Commons when they express the satisfaction they feel, and their readiness to consider in a manner becoming the occasion the recommendation brought to our notice in the Message from the Crown. (Cheers.)"
