The position of affairs in the United States is every day becoming more serious. A very destructive war is likely to be waged by the contending parties unless one of them will accede to the demands of the other, which neither seems likely to do unless compelled. The North cannot give up the position it has taken, which is the only one it could take; and the South will not give up its assumed position. The South has also no sympathy from foreign nations, which fact will operate very much against its cause. A marauding campai n would seem the most advisable for Jefferson Davis; and this, indeed, he inclines to effect in part by his privateers. Like all rebellions that are secretly fanned by traitors in power, and tampered with it stead of being crushed in the bud, the pro-slavery rebellion has begun operations far in advance of the preparations of the defences of the government, and will have the advantage for a time. But the tide will turn, and the evil consequences will likely fall to the portion of the rebels. Wise legislation demands that the question of Slavery be now decided forever, and in view of the policy of the contending parties on the subject, it might not be difficult to predict what its doom will be.
