tioned. A gentleman was met in the street by a friend, who was so much struck by his appearance that he asked him if he was ill. " No," was the reply, " I am quite well, only I should like a little more breath." His friend insisted upon his going home, and put him in a cab. Arrived at home, he had no sooner lain down than he became delirious, and within 24 hours was a corpse. The cold had struck on his lungs, and vital congestion had followed.
