

treason crushed at whatever cost. And in order to this the most speedy and energetic proceedings will be the safest and best for all concerned. The more effective the means, the surer, the sooner, and with the least sacrifice will the object be accomplished.

A writer in the N. Y. Observer gives the following incident:—

Standing upon the platform of a railroad station in Westchester Co. near our own residence, a day or two since, were many residents, eager to obtain the latest news from the scene of strife at Baltimore. Among them was an elderly gentleman, who had just communicated the fact that a son, a blacksmith in the city, had that morning informed him that he had joined one of the volunteer regiments of New York, and was on the eve of departure, and that he had requested him to receive his wife and give her a home during his absence.

At this moment a heavy train hove in sight from the east, bearing a large regiment from Mass. As the train passed without stopping, a letter was thrown from one of the cars, which landed near the feet of this elderly gentleman, who, on picking it up and finding no direct in on the envelope, asked a person near him to read it. The following is a verbatim copy of it:

"En route for WASHINGTON."

"Dear Mother,—You will be surprised when you know that I am enlisted in the Mass. volunteers, to go to Washington to help protect our country against traitors and murderers. I have left Anne (his wife) in good hands; the baby and Lottie are well as usual. I hope to do my duty to my country, or die in trying. They have murdered two of our men in Baltimore, and they will have to pay dearly for it."

"Yours affectionately,"

"THOS. COLES."

This letter proved to be from another son, from Waltham, in Mass. Neither of the sons had any knowledge that the other intended to enlist in the service of his country. Nor had the father any intimation of the fact from either till that morning!

The entire North is stirred with this spirit. In many instances father and sons are both found in the ranks. All comes of firing on Fort Sumter, and inviting pirates to war on the country.

The New York World refers to the terrible loss to the Country which will take place, and calls upon the Farmers to make extra exertions to raise greater crops:—

Farmers! I call on you to work harder, and hire more help, and put in more grain, or put it in better, and add at least one-fourth this year to your average product. He who hires one hand more on his farm, or buys an extra ton of guano, or a like value of whatever fertilizer, thus increases the aggregate of Grain and Meat, and will be doing a noble work for the country. Everything that man or beast can eat is morally certain to be wanted, and is very likely to command good prices. War involves pig-nitic waste, and armies devour like clouds of locusts. Farmers everywhere! We entreat you to double your exertions for great crops, and be ready to give freely and largely for the defence of the country!

The N. Y. Methodist delivers itself in the following martial spirit:—

In war for the right no men make better soldiers than Christians. History proves the fact. Our rallying hosts include thousands such, and every blow they strike will be in the name of the Lord God of Hosts, who has invested government with his own divine authority. Hundreds of Methodist young men have responded to the recent call of their country. All our churches in this city have sent them forward with prayers. We thank God for this patriotism. His blessing be with our brethren in the field! Let them bear in mind, as they march beneath their unfurled but insulted flag, that the rights of governments are the rights of God, and let them be mightily in his almighty strength. They march to uphold a Constitution the most equitable and most advanced in the world—a country whose Christian agencies reach to most of the ends of the earth, but against which treasonable and sacrilegious hands are now raised. Never did a people enter the field for a holier cause. Israel, moving beneath the pillar of cloud by day and of fire by night, could not have a sublimer consciousness of the divine sanction.

BISHOP POTTER of Pennsylvania has issued the following form of prayer, to be used in the Episcopal Churches of that Diocese during the war:—

O Almighty God, who art a strong tower of defence to those who put their trust in Thee, whose power no creature is able to resist, we make our humble cry to Thee in this hour of our country's need. Thy property is always to have mercy. Deal not with us according to our iniquities; but stretch forth the right hand of Thy Majesty, and be our defence for Thy name's sake. Have pity upon our brethren who are in arms against the constituted authorities of the land, and show them the error of their way. Shed upon the counsels of our rulers the spirit of wisdom and moderation and fruness, and unite the hearts of our people as the heart of one man in upholding the supremacy of Law, and the cause of justice and peace. Abate the violence of passion: banish pride and prejudice from every heart, and incline us all to trust in Thy righteous Providence, and to be ready for every duty. And oh, that in this great mercy, thou wouldst hasten the return of unity and concord to our borders, and so order all things that peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety, may be established among us for all generations. These things, and whatever else thou shalt see to be necessary and convenient for us, we humbly beg through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour, Amen.

## DOMESTIC.

### Election News.

The Royal Gazette Extra of the 14th instant, contains "A Proclamation" dissolving the General Assembly, and ordering Writs for elections, returnable on the twenty eighth of June. It is understood that the candidates for the City of St. John will be the Hon. S. L. Tilley and Hon. C. Watters, Liberals; and J. W. Lawrence and W. H. Scovill, Esqrs. Conservatives. J. W.

Cudd, John Jordan, C. N. Skinner, and James Smith, Esqrs., Liberals, have been nominated by a committee as candidates for the County of St. John. A mass meeting of the party will be held this evening (Thursday), to ratify the nominations. It is understood that Hon. J. H. Gray, R. D. Wilmot, and Mr. A. McGee, will be candidates on the Conservative ticket for the County of St. John. The fourth man has not been decided on. Mr. T. W. Anglin is also a candidate! The "Church Witness" says:—

"The Editor of the 'Freeman,' Mr. T. W. Anglin, offers himself as a candidate to represent the City and County. He says in his card, truly enough, that 'his political opinions and principles are well known.' So well known, we will add, that he is totally unfit to represent a British constituency."

We endorse this expression fully. It would be a burning disgrace to the Protestants of St. John, and all Loyal Subjects, to allow a man to have a seat in the Parliament of a country, whose Sovereign he hates, and whose institutions he traduces.

We understand that at a meeting of the Conservatives of King's County, at Ossekeag, on Wednesday, Dr. Vail, Dr. Earl, Junr., and W. B. Scovill Esq., were nominated as candidates on the Conservative ticket. A meeting of the Liberal party is to take place next week. Mr. Samuel Freeze, of Norton, has issued a card to the electors, offering his services also. All the old members for York will be in the field again; also G. L. Hatheway, Esq., Mr. A. D. Verx, and several others. We have nothing definite from other Counties yet.

FIRE.—On Friday night last a fire broke out in the buildings occupied by Mr. J. E. McDonald, King St., which did considerable damage to the premises, and also to Mr. Tisdale's house fronting on German St.

The News of Monday says:—We regret to learn that the residence of Isaac Raymond, Esq., Norton, was destroyed by fire one day last week—uninsured.

Dr. Hatheway's residence in Hazen St., was seriously, and some adjoining buildings destroyed by fire, on Sabbath evening last.

The residence of Mr. Charles P. Dixon of Norton, was destroyed by fire on Saturday night last.

SUDDEN DEATHS.—The uncertainty of human life is strikingly illustrated in the many sudden deaths by both sickness and accidents which have recently taken place in different parts of the country. The melancholy bereavement of the family of Mr. Lawrence, of Kingsclear York County, within the last few months, in the loss of his Son-in-law and two grand children, and since, two sons, young men, and a daughter aged about seventeen years—all of fever—should remind us that the most healthy and happy families are not exempt from the most unlooked for changes, and also be a warning to the young as well as the aged to "prepare to meet God."

On Thursday last a man named John Agnew, fell off a raft of logs at Kingsclear and was drowned! He left a wife and five children. On the same day a young man named Tomlinson was drowned at Tay Creek, while employed in breaking a jam of logs! A little boy named L. in Frederick has been missing some days, it is supposed he has fallen into the river and been drowned! Mr. Samuel Taber was drowned, by falling off a point of logs, in Haxford's Brook, St. Martins on the 8th inst. He has left a wife and several children.

INTENDED DESEDITION.—A discovery was made in the garrison in Frederick, last week, of arrangements made by a Sergeant and 30 soldiers, to desert to the United States. They were all arrested, and the Sergeant was put in irons until a Court Martial should be called to try them. The troops at Frederick have since been removed to Halifax.

Dr. Hza.—This gentleman has resigned the Presidency of the University, and his connection with that institution is expected to cease at the expiration of the present term.

IMMIGRANTS.—A barque with 111 immigrants arrived in this port from London on Tuesday. We learn that some of them have friends at Sussex Vale, and intend settling there. Several families arrived in this city by last steamer from Boston, with the intention it is said of settling in this Province.

OUR HARBOUR.—We counted on one position on Friday morning, forty first class Ships in the Harbour, whose aggregate tonnage is, say 40,000; the number of vessels, large and small, on the same day, was supposed to be 130. This is a pretty good beginning for our Spring Fleet.—[News.]

## Obituary.

Died at Cornwallis on the 16th of February, Mary, the beloved wife of our much respected brother Jonathan Ellis, in the 67th year of her age, much and truly lamented by a large circle of relatives and friends who justly mourn her departure. As a wife and a mother she was kind and judicious, as a neighbor, charitable, loved and respected, and as a Christian, consistent and exemplary. Our departed sister was first married to Mr. Joseph Lockhart, father of our beloved brother, Deacon Jacob Lockhart, and subsequently to Jonathan Ellis, when she became the mother of a large family. Her example with that of her husband has been instrumental in pointing her children to that beloved Saviour whom nearly all of them have embraced. She professed religion in about A. D. 1820 under the labors of the Rev. John Pines, by whom she was baptized. She became identified with the Congregational Church in which she remained till a writer organized the first Free Christian Baptist Church in this place in 1841, to which she gave her heart and labors, and in which she

has continued a consistent follower of Christ.—Her children rise up and call her blessed. In A. D. 1850 she was suddenly seized with a paralytic stroke which has confined her to her bed for eleven years; but never has she been known to murmur. Her chief enquiry was of the welfare of the cause of God; how often when returning from meeting to her house have I heard her praise God for what he was doing in saving souls. Within a few weeks of her death she had symptoms which betokened sudden dissolution. On my leaving her when I last visited her I asked: "Sister, are you tired staying here? you have a better home above," to which she answered: "With Heaven beaming in her face," "yes, how I long to be gone." It was the next called on to attend her funeral which was attended by a large assembly, where joy and mourning were mingled together: mourning at parting from a beloved wife and mother, but joy in the full expectation of meeting again ere long where parting will be no more.

The sermon was preached by the writer from Job, 19: 23, 26, & 27 vs. "I know that my Redeemer liveth." She still lives in the heart of a bereaved husband and family, and of the Church of Christ.
