What in all the catalogue of imaginary wrongs inflicted on the slaveholders of our Union, can compare with this ?-Had southern men, from all the different slaveholding states, been thus wantonly sacrificed and the soil of every free State been stained with their blood they would have something to complain of, and our chief executive would have had some reason to talk of the wrongs the north had inflicted on the south, and Pandemonium itself would hardly been able to rival the tumult not in the Southren States only, but at our na tion's capital. How is it now? Our widows weep, our orphan children weep, the fathers and mothers of our young men weep, erect a tomb stone to the memory of their murdered friends their dearest friends, whose only crime was that they were born in a northren state, or at th worst, that they were not wholly recreant to th laws of nature and of God, and the nation hold its peace, for slavery has done it, and slavery must not be condemned. And these murderers parade these facts before the world as though they were the aggrieved party, and had a right to claim the sympathy and praise of heaven and earth, and northren office seekers respond Amen. May God pity them when, sooner or later, their judgement comes, for come it must.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT. Occasionally when a foul murder has been committed, or some other crime perpetrated, for which the LAW requires the life of the guilty, a great cry is raised by some parties against capital punishment. The subject has been discussed over and over again, and we do not believe a new argument could be adduced on either side; we therefore regret that the subject should be brought up so frequently. For ourselves, as we have before expressed, we believe the death penalty is Scriptural and right, but we are truly glad that the poor unfortunate men, whose lives according to law were forfeited for their crimes, have received the Executive elemency, and are to under go imprisonment rather than death.

CRIMINALS. The following paragraph from the "Church Witness" of last week discloses a state of things in relation to some crimina's radieally wrong, and should lead to some mode of dealing with them more adapted to their welfare, and calculated to give them the advantage of every good resolution :-

Visiting this Institution (the Penitentiary) the other day, I saw there four young women, all desirous of entering upon a new course of life when their term of imprisonment is served. One had been taken from our Poor House many years ago when quite young. She had been at farm service on the river St. John. A short time ago, she had come to the City to see her mother; the wretched woman led her daughter into the paths of vice which she was in, and from these she found the way to the Penitentiary. It was her first committal, and day and night does she, with buter tears, mourn over her fall, and wish to be back to her home in the country; but now she feels there is no hope for her, but misery here and hereafter. Her case is only one of many inside those walls. While here, too, I saw some young lads who, for trivial offences, should not be in the same room with murderers and other great criminals, and thus have their spirits and energy broken for life.

It is time now to show some practical evidences of our bousted Christianity. Instead of the sentimentalism that prevails in our midst, in the case of punishment for great crimes, let us rather by practical means endeavor to prevent crime, by those measures which are at once Christian as well as easy of attainment.
