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MEETING OF THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION. The Congregational Union of Canada met at Kingston, on the 12th inst, and closed yesterday. Your correspondent whose time has been occupied in attending these meetings, will devote the present letter to such subjects as are connected with the engagements of the past week, giving priority to the Congregational Union only because he has not had the opportunity as yet of obtaining the necessary information respecting other denominations to report them inteligently, They will be reported in subsequent letters.

It is with great pleasure that record is made of the good feeling and brotherly love which marked the proceedings from first to last. It was feared that some fiction would have manifested itself in connexion with the missionary business of the year, but the fear was removed at an early stage of the meetings; and for a short time so took the brethen by surprise that a spirit of silence seemed to have fallen upon the Assembly. Persons who came with the determi- decide. nation to resist certain foreshadowed action were disarmed by the withdrawal of intended measures, and the relief occasioned thereby, soon exhibited i self in various ways. For the information of the general reader it may be stated that the missionary operations of the denomina. tion are conducted in the following manner: The Colonial Society, so called, a missionary organization whose head-quarters is in London, and the Canada Congregational Missionary Society combine their labor so far as Canada 18 concerned on principles laid down in a constitution. At the Annual meeting of the Union in Canada a committee is chosen, to whose judgement are submitted all applications for missionary aid. This committee decided upon the necessary appropriations, and forwards a schedule to the Colonial Society's Committee in London. The money to meet these appropriations comes in part from Canada, and the remainder from the Colonial Society: The proportion varies in different years; the latter usually furnishing considerably more than one halt. If the Committee in England do not object to the schedule within three months it stands as recommended by our Caradian Committee. If objection is made, it is remitted for reconsideration, Last year the English brethren proposed a reduction of twenty per cent on all grants to churches over five years on the Society's funds, and insisted that is apparent to those who know anything of missions. CONSTITUTION OF THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION.

A word or two concerning the constitution of the Congregational Union, may interest, and perhaps inform, some readers. Congregational Churches are independent of each other in so far admits, disciplines, and expels its own members; calls and dimisses its pastor; elects all officers, and otherwise controls its own affairs. Siseach other-if that phrase be allowed-recognizing each other's letters of dismission, and in other ways maintaining intercommunion. For consultation upon matters affecting the Denomination as a whole, a voluntary Association, called a Union, is formed, comprising such ministers and churches as desire to unite for the inmembership of churches and of pastors is distinct; and non-connection of either church or Usually our churches and pastors are members by envious spirit towards Ireland. Lord John of Union. Each church is entitled to send two delegates, whose votes count as do the ministerial members. The Union commands nothing; it only recommends. The power it wields therefore is purely moral. This is thought to be sufficient for all practibal purposes. Not interfering with the discipline of the churches, its only action towards an erring brother is to withdraw from fellowship with him. This arrangement simplifies the action of the Union, and gives time for what is regarded as legitimate busi-

Devotional exercises such as preaching, prayer, exhortation and brief narratives of the state of the churches, occupy a considerable portion of time. Several evenings are given to public meetings.

. The affairs of our College and magazine, al though kept distinct from the Union, are brought forward; also a society called "the ministers, widows and orphen's Society," holds its meetings at the same time. These with the missionary committee's deliberations fill up the week and are regarded as bearing a close relation to the welfare of the Denomination.

United States.
