Beyond the concentration of troops at and near Washington, no important movement had taken place during the last week. Within the week 13,000 Federal troops lave entered Washington from the North, and more are on the way. A large body of U. S. troops are row west of the Potomec. The Confederates are also mustering their forces in large numbers at Manassas Junes tion and Fairfax Court House. In regard to the plans of either army we have no information.

Captain Prince, with four hundred Union troops arrived at Liberty, Missouri, on the 18th inst. surrounded the town and secured about thirty secessionists. They all took the oath and went their way, excepting Brigadier General Jessie Morin, who was detained as a prisoner for refusing to be sworn.

It is still asserted that the Confederate leaders are, informally, making propositions of peace, or the ground of a recognition of Southern in lependence; but the Admin stration will listen t no proposition except an unconditional submis sion to the rightful authority of the Government against which they have rehelled.

Twelve thousand of the Harper's Ferry rebe troops are reported to be encamped on the Fair grounds, near Winchester.

The Boston Journal reports the capture of a foreign ship, laden with arms and ammunition.

A letter roceived at East Boston from New port News, dated June 25, says that a prize valued at \$600,000 had been captured and brought to Fortress Monroe a new clipper ship, with 40,000 stand of arms, a number of brass rifled cannon, and a large quantity of ammunition. She was captured by the Quaker City off Charleston harbour.


