AN ACT in addition to, and in amendment of, an act passed in the twenty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled .- An Act to place the appointment of the Commissioners of Water Supply and Sewarage for Carleton, in the City of St. John, in the Common Council of the said City, and for other purposes. Whereas, by the first section of the said Act, so passed in the twenty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign, it was enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, so much of the Act passed in the eighteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled, an Act to authorize that part of the City of St. John called Carleton, to obtain Water from Spruce and other Lakes, and the Mayor, Aldermen, and

Commonalty of the said City to issue scrip to pay the expenses of so doing as vested in the Lieutenant Governor and Council, the appointment of three Commissioners for the management of the business in connection therewith, be, and was thereby re-And, Whereas, by the second section of the said Act so passed, in the twenty-third year of Her Ma-jesty's Reign, it was enacted, that the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of St. John in Council convened, shall have full power and authority to appoint, remove, and re-appoint three persons to be Commissioners of Water and Sewarage in

Carleton, one of whom shall be nominated by the said Common Council, as Chairman of the said Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council, and Assembly as follows ;-1st-That from and after the passing of this Act, so much of the said last mentioned Act passed in the twenty third year of Her Majesty's Reign, as vests the appointment of the said Commissioners in the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of St. John in Council convened, be, and the

same sre hereby repealed.
2d—That the third and seventh sections of the said last mentioned Act be, and the same are hereby 3d-Instead of the appointment of Commissioners as heretofore, the said Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners shall be elected annually by the Freemen and Freeholders of the said part of the City of St John called Carleton, and the respective Councillors of Guy's and Brook's Ward, in Carleton aforesaid shall, ex-officio, be the other Commissioners.

4th-That the first election of such Chairman shall in the present year, and as soon after as possible the said Chairman shall be sworn and take upon himself the duties of his office. 5th-That after the present year, the said Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners shall be elected on the first Tuesday in April in each and every year, and he shall be ballo ed for at the same

time and place with the Aldermen and Councillors of Carleton aforesaid, and his name shall be contained in the ballot with the said Aldermen and Councillors. 6th-That all persons shall be qualified to vote at any such election of Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners, who at the time of such election are, as Freemen and Freeholders of the City of St. John, in Carleton, aforesaid, qualified to vote at any elec-tion of Aldermen, Councillor or Constable in Carle ton aforesaid.

7th-In respect of every election of such Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners, the said Chairman shall be elected under the same rules, regulations, and conditions that a member of the Common Council is now elected under in the said city, and the regulations contained in the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth fourteenth, fifteenth, sixtcenth, seventeenth, eighteenth, nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first, twentysecond, twenty-third, twenty-fourth, twenty fifth, twenty sixth, and twenty-ninth sections of an Act, as it now amended exists, passed in the sixteenth year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled,-" An Act to amend the Charter of the City of St. John, and certain Acts of Assembly relating to the Lecal Government of the City of St. John," shall be observed, and the same shall extend and apply to, and be part and parcel of this Act the same as if the said sections were severally, particularly and respectively re-peated and re-enacted, and were declared in the body of this Act, only that the same shall apply to the election of the said Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners, instead of to the election of Mayor, Aldermen, Councillor or Constable of the said City, and shall be for the election of the said Chairman of he said Board of Commissioners. Provided always, that when the elections of the said Chairman takes place at the same time and place as that of the Alfermen and Councillors of the said City, but one baliot shall be used, the same to, contain the name of Aldermen, Councillor, and the said Chairman,

8th-The said Chairman shall have a salary of Seven Hundred Dollars per Annum, the same to cover and defray all expenses of office, and no further sum shall be allowed him for or on account of office expenses, or for the hire of office clerk or collector. 9th-Each of the said other Commissioners shall receive Two Dol!ars for every day's actual attendance on the duties of his office, provided that the aggregate amount shall not exceed sixty dollars for each Commissioner in any ene year.

10th .- No member of the Common Council shall, while he is such member, be eligible to be elected to be Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners, or to hold office under them.

11th.—The present Commissioners, or others that may be appointed in their stead by the Common Council of St. John, shall remain in office until a Chairman is elected and in office under this Act. 12th.—The said Chairman of the said Board of Commissioners so elected, and the other two Commissioners under this Act, shall have the like powers and privileges, and shall in every respect perform, fulfil, and be subject to the like duties, the same as if they had been appointed by the said Mayor, Aldernen and Commonalty of St. John, as hereinbefore
