CoBURG, 14th May, 1861. GOVERNMENT AND THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY. USURY LAWS .- BROCKVILLE MURDER CASE.

In the lull occasioned by the preparations for civil war in the United States, Canadians have an opportunity to consider some of the doings of Parliament. The strength of the present Ministry was recently shown in a vote of the Lower House on the question of censuring the Government for making very large allowances to the Grand Trunk Reilway without the consent of Parliament. More than one million of dollars had passed from the Provincial Chest to the credit of the Railway-an institution which deserves to be classed among Agur's " three things that are never satisfied, yea, four things which say not, It is enough." We can now understand why there was no foreshadowing of legislation on the Grand Trunk Railway in the speech from the Throne. Relief had been granted already without the formality of a Law Just think of one million one hundred and seventy-four thousand dollars disbursed by the Executive on its own authority. Imagine a proportional sum given away by his Excellency's Advisers in New Brunswick, or Nova Scotia! But the House refused to say a severe word about it. The conclusion to which the "Montreal Witness" comes, in view of these facts, is that "our Ministry would need to be immaculate men, for they have now earte blanche to plunder the public to any extent they choose, and divide the spoils as they like:" and who can say that the inference is unfair? If the Railway gave satisfaction and accommodated the public; if it passed merchandize, produce, and passengers along the line with despatch, there would be a a grave offence against the recognized functions of the Legislature; but it is notorious that the public is not accommodated: that the mails are delivered inconveniently, and freight may be on the road from a week to a morth without redress. Even perishable articles are sometimes subjected to this grievous treatment.
