prayed as it was found; and the unnatural father may now be seen in his prison "picking oakum," not possessing physical strength for the exercise of the treadmill. The public horror has again been excited by the charge against another father of high rank, of having, from a similar cause, killed the infant son, by transferring him for that purpose to persons of the lowest grade in society, to be sent to the poor-house or trained up among beggars, thieves, and prostitutes. The technical charge, indeed, is that of having made a false entry of the birth at the Registrar's office. At the hearing before the magistrates, the counsel for the prisoner was instructed to insinuate that the lady was not a faithful wife, and that the infant son, by his marriage with the child's legitimacy, and this will probably be the line of defence taken at a future stage of the proceedings. But the magistrates have sent the case for trial to the Assizes; accepting, bail, however,—the accused in £500, and some one else in the same amount. The whole subject, as it has been given in the newspapers, is of a strange character, that it reads like a piece of fiction. The defendant, an impenetrable mystery, which amused and interested us in the days of our youth; and perhaps the most ingenious romance could hardly have outdone this plain, straightforward story of real life.—[English Court, to Methodist.

MIDNIGHT MEETINGS IN LONDON.—We rejoice to find that the Committee of the Midnight Mission propose a renewal of their most praiseworthy and benevolent efforts during the ensuing winter. No effort of modern times was more open to suspicion as to its policy, or doubt as to its success,—We have rid our Ministers of the necessity of being so to the successful issue of the movement. For ourselves, we never could doubt. We had faith in the old Gospel to raise the most deeply fallen, and in the energy of the Holy Spirit to regenerate the most depraved. Facts confirm the anticipation. From a circular just issued it appears that 4,000 women have attended the meetings. And of this number eighty-nine have been reclaimed by their friends, seventy-nine have been placed in service, six have married; two have been reconciled to their husbands; eighty-one have been placed in homes and 358 have been moved in the provinces. Cheering results! and sufficient to encourage the hope of a more successful campaign during the ensuing winter.

FOREIGN.—In India, considerable sensation has been made by the imprisonment of a missionary who, for interesting himself in a native work, exposing the oppression of the native laborers on the indigo plantations, had been indicted at the instigation of the Government. The Madras Conference at Calcutta had, almost unanimously, passed resolutions of sympathy with the missionary. The case illustrates again that the missionaries, if faithfully discharging their duty, must be prepared to encounter the opposition of the English Government as well as of most of the wealthy European planters, while on the other hand they are fully rewarded by the increasing confidence of the native population.

In China the field of Missionary preparation has been, of late, widely extended, but still number of large provinces are entirely uncultivated.

One of the strongest proofs that the Temporal Power of the Pope has become utterly untenable lies in the fact that many prominent theologians begin to favor its abolition. The Rev. Dr. Romanus, abbot Lirerani, and the distinguished church-historian Dollinger, have been followed by Father Passaglia, formerly a member of the order of Jesuits, and now Professor at the Roman University, who used to be regarded as the greatest Catholic authority in Italy. He has just published a pamphlet against the temporal power which has made a deep sensation.

ARRIVAL OF THE "ETNA."

Steamer *Etna* from Liverpool, 8th, intercepted off Cape Race, 10 p. m., Friday.

Times editorially thinks Sweden for just exercise of its veto, in favor of the memorial against Russell, although his reply shows strong undercurrent of spite. Times repudiates charges against Russell, and believes good sense of Americans will be the folly of interfering. Russell's latest letter written from Baltimore is devoted to a consideration of the position of Maryland.

Mr. Lindsey, M. P., in a public lecture, again strongly urges the expediency of England and France endeavoring to effect a peaceful separation of the Great Eastern reached Milford for repairs, but says the Government will exert its right, requiring security for persons, property, and fulfilment of engagements.

Vanderhoff, the celebrated actor, died, aged 67, at Cologne, Prussia, arrived on a visit to Naples at Capri on the 7th, left on the 8th. Proceedings cordial, but nothing political. He has been a member of the Imperial and Royal Order of the most important State papers on America.

King of Holland expelled from France on the 12th, remaining a week.

American Minister at Berlin was negotiating with Hanover the ratification of conditions about the State dispute.

Spanish have consented to deliver up Neapolitan archives.

Insurrection at Orulunda. Russian Eagle crossed the Public Buildings and Polish Eagle arrested. Mayor of the town killed.

News from Russia reports the death of the Emperor of China.

SUMMARY OF AMERICAN NEWS.

Nothing further of importance has transpired at the seat of war.

The news summary of the N. Y. *Methodist* of Saturday last contains the following:—

The great naval expedition which has been fitting out for some time, has at last sailed, the country anxiously hopes to hear soon exploits as brilliant and as important as occupation of Hatteras Inlet. Hereafter the coast of the Southern States will become the theatre of our naval operations. During past week reports have been received from Southern newspapers of two engagements in the Gulf of Mexico, the one on the island of Santa Rosa, and the other near New Orleans. The rebels claim to have been successful in both, but it is believed that the official account of the engagements will put a different construction upon them. Beside the new naval expedition, also an army by land is expected to commence soon operations against the Gulf States. It is to be sent from California through Mexico into Western Texas.

Another division—that of Gen. McCall—crossed the Potomac, and occupied Lake Harpers Ferry has also been recaptured by troops, and it was expected that the entire force of Gen. Banks would soon be on the Virginia side of the Potomac. South of Alexandria, a successful expedition up the Dumfries Creek has been carried out by Lieutenant Howell.

No change in the position of the armies on the Potomac.

It is currently reported and believed, on good authority, that ere long an important movement must take place.

The Custom House of New Orleans was being fortified and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed; the excitement throughout the city being intense. All classes anxious to be enrolled.

The offer of 100 millions from British Capitalists is incorrect.

BOSTON, Oct. 22d.

Lexington, Missouri, was captured from the Rebels with slight loss of life.

The report that Gen. Fremont will be to superintend the military operations Extravagance in public expenditures appears to be the principal cause.

Yesterday five companies of the Massachusetts 16th regiment crossed to Virginia from Hanson's Island and were attacked by a large force under Gen. Evans. The Federals maintained their ground until Col. Baker arrived with reinforcements, whereupon a smart action ensued. Col. Baker was killed. He was United States Senator from Oregon. The Federal retreated in good order to Hanson's Island, which despatches say they will be able to hold. The Rebels numbered from 7 to 10,000. Col. Baker's entire force 1,800.
