The war in New Zealand promises to involve this country in a very serious expenditure. W perceive that the Bombay Gozernment, in accordance with instructions received from Downing-street, have chartered two vessels for the purpose of conveying a large body of troops to New Zealand. The sum to be paid was £19 10s, and £24 per head respectively. These figures will afford the British taxpayer some idea of the little bill which he will have to pay in connexion with

Advices from Vienna announce that numerous corps are being sent to Hungary, They go from the Austrian capital and the other cities of the empire, by railway, to Presburg, Raab, and Pesth. The Austrian Government, in order to prevent new attacks on the imperial eagles in Hungary, has ordered that they shall be everywhere removed, except from the buildings belonging to the minstries of finance and war. In the facade of the town-hall at Pesth there was for more than a century an eagle sculptured in stone, but it has been eff ced.

The death of the Earl of Aberdeen, which took place, recently had been long anticipated. and for nearly two years his political life had virtually closed. But the departure of an ex-Premier of Great Britain from this wold's stage is wothy of note, and the noble earl's career has been associated with some of the greatest events in modern history.

THE marriage of the Princess Alice has been definitively settled-to be solemnized during the ensuing season in London-with Prince Lou's of Hesse Darmstadt. Prince Louis is the eldes! son of Prince Charles, brother and heir presumptive of Grand Duke, who has no chidren. UNITED STATES.

The Washington corespondent to the New York Independent writing under date of 14th inst., says :--

The revolution goes on rapidly. South Carolinna, Florida, Alabama, and Mississippi are already out of the Union, so far as their Conventions can take them out. In a very short time Georgia, Louisiana, and Texas will have joined the rebels. Virginia proposes to secede sometime in February. The most fierce contest hetween the Unionists and the Rayolu ionists will be upon the soil of Maryland. The conflict there is already warm and exciting, and every hour it increases in intensity, A vast dea! depends upon the issue-much more than the simple question of the secession of a single slave state from the Union. If Maryland remains in the present Confederacy, one thing is settled beyond a contingency, which is, that the Potomac will be the Southern boundary of the Northern United States if a peaceable separation is agreed to by the parties. If Maryland goes out, then the question is precipitated upon the Government-will it abandon Washington and the public buildings, and remove to some Northern or Western city, or will it take its stand here, and make a fight not only in defense of the capital, but keep open a line of communication with the tree states across the state of Maryland, its people being in a state of rebeltion ?

The rapidity of the march of startling events almost paralyzes the Government. The revolution is so sucessful that nothing but open war will put is down, and it is somewhat doubtful if that will do it. The great subject occupies the entire attention of our national legislators.

From an article in the Independant of the 17th
