Little is room left for foreign topics, nor is comments on them required. Italy is now nom inaily one, and Birmingham firm has an order to supply cen million pieces of coin with Victor Emmanuel's head, surrounded by the word announcing him as King of Italy. Yet the Pope is a temporal sovereign, and French bayonets prop his Ceasar's chair. The Emperor of Austria is in the thick of his constitutional resolution. His brother of Russia has proclaimed the emancipation of the serfo, but two years must elapse before they will take their place as free citizens. When so, can he deny them a constitution? The Poles, so quiet through the revolutinary year 1848, have been making a mass movement frowned on by the Czar, but drawing from him a promise of large reforms. The French Parliment-so it deserves to be called, for it can talk of nothing else-has been discussing the asdresses in reply to the Empero's speech; at which pleasant occupation it has been engaged since the begining of last month. Napoleon must be delighted to find the Legitimists vant so widely as to be bringing into contempt the new liberty which he has accorded them.

American affairs have for us a very deep and painful interest. The North is alienating our commercial sympathies by its Protectionist tariff, but the South never had any to alienate. We know Protectionism can't succeed in keeping out our goods; we wish we were as sure that this pslitical conflict would usher in the jubilee of human freedom. For that blest day God is

The Insurrection in Poland.

"complete tranquillity prevails at Warsaw," but the national demonstrations have dissappeared simply because of the presence of a great militsoldiery. It is said-" The shop windows contain nothing but articles of mourning, and the book-sellers' windows nothing but black prayerbooks. Photographic portraits of those who fell in the late disturbances are sold in great quantities. 'The burial-ground in which they were all interred has been decorated with a great number of flower wreaths." On Saturday last, religious funeral ceremonies took place in all the churches of Warsaw- which the Russian rulers sought in vain to prevent; and the fact is strikingly suggestive of what must be the deep-seated senti ments of the masses of the people; and of the improbability that the insurrection will be easily put down. Previous letters from Warsaw state that the agitation, though " muffled," was on the increase. Russian troops continue to arrive. It was hoped and expected that the Emperor will grant a constitution to Poland. The events have a peculiar character. If the movement succeeds it will be one of the most extraordinary ever recorded by history. It is not an armed insurrection. The immence population, which rose like one man in the streets of Warsaw, has employed moral strength only in a peaceful demonstration. Neither the brutal attacks of the police nor the aggression of the soldiers disturbed maintain. While some of its members were shot dead in the streets, not one man of the troops. was killed.
