A third candidate was in the field for a time-Mr. H. Fawcett the peculiarity of whose case was that he was blind. This fact was greatly against him, for very much of modern parliamentary life consists in business that requires eyesight for its performance. But for this, Mr. Fawcett would have been, I think the public favourite. He is a young man of high educational and natural ability, and is deeply interested in questions of social reform. He recired from the contest, and his municipal supporters helped to swell Mr Layard's ranks. Each af these gentlemen were seen by a temperance deputation, and the favourable nature of Mr. Layard's reply also won for him the support of the electors at Ripon an election is pending, and Dr. F. R. Lees, of temperanee celebrity, has issued an address to the electors.
