A letter from Father Chiniquy, which appears in the last Montreal Witness, appeals to the Chris'ians of British North America for help to establish a college in which young French Canadians may be educated for the Christian Ministry; of the \$10,000 contributed towards this object in Great Britain \$7,000 are lost, through the failure of two banks through which the money was transmitted from England. From all the evidence which is presented, it would appear that Father Chiniquy is not a good man of business; and the Montreal Wituess sensibly urges him to imitate the conduct of the Apostle Paul, who was very careful to avoid the possibility of being blamed in the management of money, and declined to recieve and disburse it personally. Others who have been entrusted with money besides Father Chiniquy, would be the better of following Paul's example. It is imperative that the books be properly kept, and a faithful account given of the stewardship. Losses of money when passing through the hands of agents, are, to say the lerst, unfortunate.

The London Anti-Slavery Society has issued a notice, which presents some facts unknown to the writer, and many others in Canada, until now. The Society is not responsible for John Anderson's goving to England. Although instrumental in procuring his release, by the interposition of the English Court of Queen's Bench, they discouraged the not unnatural desire of Anderson to visit Great Britain, believing that he was perfectly safe in Canada, and would be in a better position to provide for himself. As to his safety here, your correspondent is less confident than our English friends. There is such a thing as kidnapping, and John Anderson once on United States soil, might bid farewell to freedom, unless a mob was gathered to rescue him; and in England he is more secure against forcible abduction than any part of Canada. The notice referred to also informs the reader that Anderson declined the Society's offer "to get up a special committee to make a private appeal, or a public one through the Press as that committee might decide-with a view to obtain funds to enable him to provide for himself in the future." The hope is expressed that his friends "will disconnect the effort making for him from ruy and every other," as third parties are using him as a pretext for promoting their own objects.
