Four or five days of insurrection have sufficed to sweep away a monarchy West. Vonitza, Missolonghi, Naupactus, and Patras rose simultaneously, but by the 22d, the Eastern

Friday, the 24th, the king fled, and a provisional government was established at Athens. Otho, before leaving, abdicated in favor of his brother Leopold, but the victorious revolutionists would have nothing more to do with the Bavarians. The provisional government, in the name of the people and the army, has declared the dynasty of King Otho to be deposed. a National Assembly has been convoked, and Greece, once more kingless and independent, is to decide its own future, after a generation has passed away amid failure and disappointment. For the unhappy man who is now added to the long list of fugitive princes, nobody has a good word to say, and it is not the least likely, that in the most retrogade Cabinet of Europe, there will be found a single politician to advise that he should be supported in any attempt to regain his kingdom. If ever there was a ruler who displayed total incapacity for governing, it was Otho. It may truly be said of him, that since he acceded to actual power, twenty-seven years ago, he has done nothing but mischief.
