A party of the heathen, however, who said they would not live with the believers, left the place, leaving behind them a man, his wife, and child, who refused to follow the heathen any longer. This family had pitched their tent at some distance; but the Christians, filled with love, went Undaunted, follow on where Duty leads. to them, took down their tent, and placed it in The poison-breathing pit, the rushing flame, the midst of their own dwellings. They gave The treacherous waves, the fiercely-roaring storm ;-the strangers a welcome; all striving to show some act of kindness. The new comers were quite amazed at their charity ; and declared that, for the first time in their lives, they had found people who showed they sincerely loved them.

Another tribe, in these northern regions, heard But we have none for these. that a missionary station among the Indians had been attacked by a body of fierce savages, when some of the converts were killed; and others, who had been driven from their homes, were in a destitute state. The believers burst into tears at the account they heard, and at once offered to make a collection out of their scanty means, for the relief of the sufferers. Money they had none ; but one said, "I have a fine rein-deer, which I will gladly contribute." "And I," said a third, " will send them a seal, that they may have something to eat, and to burn in their lamps."
