A LIFE FULL OF NARROW ESCAPES, --- A MISPENT LIFE. Continued.

I remained with Brewer's Company about one year. I received an offer of engagement from Mr. T. J. Royal Albert Saloon, City-road. I was grown to manhood, therefore played other characters. I now commenced as a melo-dramatic actor and pantomimist; I played clown in two Christmas pantomines, passing under the name of Signor Francisco, from Milan. I at length left the Albert and engaged at the Old Britania, Hoxton; here I met with another accident playing with the late Mr. H. H., who personated Warwick the King Maker-I was Perkin Warbeck; he by mischance struck me a severe blow on the forehead with his battle axe. Every one thought I was killed; I lay in the hospital several weeks, at length I recovered: when I came out of that place I engaged at a penny gaff, in Ratcliff Highway. One night we were playing Jack Sheppard. I was personating Blueskin, when the police seized upon us. Of course every one tried to escape, I succeeded in doing so by ascending a chimney, where I remained three hours before I dared to come from

my hiding place.
After this I engaged at the Standard Theatre, case before my heavenly father, and considering Shoreditch. If it had struck me it would have killed me on the spot. While I was at this Theatre, a drama was produced entitled Chi Chu Ali, the Brown Fiend. In one scene was represented the ascent of the demon (accompained by his satellites), and while the trap upon which stood six men was rising, the machinery gave way, and we fell about 12 feet. I was the only one who escaped unhart. Two of my companions had an arm each broken, and another died in a few hours ofter the accident. I remained here about six months. I then went to the Effingham Saloon, Whitechapel. One night I was playing an Indian chief, and when jumping from a rock about 8 feet high on to a stage, the stage gave way, severely injuring me, so that I was confined to my bed about ten weeks. On recovering, I again returned to Effingham. In consequence of a dispute with the proprietress, Madame Delpini, I left and went to Deptford, with Mr. J. N. At this place I worked harder for the devil than ever I did before or since-the whole of my Sundays being occupied at the theatre, painting, cleaning, and rehearsing. After remaining here about 12 months, I went to Rosherville Gardens, where I met with a serious accident in falling from a rope at an altitude of 20 feet. After recovering I came to London, and in a short time I was married on the 1st of January, 1852. Shortly after my marriage I went to Southampton and Winchester, playing successfully at both places for about four years. I then joined Madame Wallet's Troupe of Serenaders and Coloured Opera Company, travelling nearly over England. I came to London in 1857, went again to the Effingham, then to the Queen's, Tottenham. court-road, Marylebone Theatre, Pavilion, City of London. Now drew on the eventful month of March, 1862, so replete with interest to me. For a month previous I had felt some unseen power working within me, and I have started up in bed two or three times in a night. The last week in April was a week of trial to me. I had been several times on the point of self-destruction, and on Saturday, March the 1st, I carned about 25s., 15s. of which I spent in drink and riot. I got home about 3 o'clock on the Sunday morning. My wife, who was suffering from illness, upbraided me for my conduct, and I went out from my home determined never to return.
