HOW TO BE SUCCESSFUL.

The Sabbath school teacher should be a person of prayer. All instruction should be accompanied by this; and the faithful teacher will find it necessary not only to season his instructions to others with prayer; but will discover that he requires for himself a constant supply of grace. He may travellers. be almost discouraged at times, yet how sweet to think he can lift the weary burden to Him who has said-" Casting all your care upon Him for He careth for you." Prayer should be not only the Christian's but the Christian teacher's " native air."

He will also be a person possessing patience, one of the most lovely fruits of piety, a rare Christian virtue indeed, and sometimes severely tried in a teacher.

He will also have perseverance, which accompanied by punctuality is of great service to a teacher. And in the next place we may add gentleness, for harshness will never contribute to success, while gentleness and love, tempered with firmness, will overcome many difficulties, and sweetly aid in leading the young to the Saviour. Other qualifications might be named; such as scriptural and general information, serious yet cheerful behaviour &c.; but enough perhaps has been said on this point.

To these must be joined a devoted heart deeply interested in this work, which is God's work. Prayer if it were cold and formal would be useless. Patience if not exercised with some aim, would well deserve the name of indolence. Hence how necessary that the groundwork should be right, and that the object should be ever in view, viz., the spiritual interests of those for whom he is labouring. If a teacher be interested in his work, he will take pains to clothe his instructions in an attractive dress, that truth may more quickly find its way to the mind. He will also study the best methods of imparting instruction; and for this purpose he will find it necessary to read and study much. The younger his class are the more simple will be his explanations, and probably there is nothing more difficult to acquire than simplicity of instruction, and at the same time to avoid foolish childishness.

If the teacher be indeed devoted, he cannot rest from his labours without feeling conscious that he has made some impression on his pupils' minds; and if he has not that consciousness, and does not see that they are improving, it certainly is a cause of much anxiety. And here knowing the proper source whence to obtain assistance, he will implore Divine grace, the influence of the Holy Spirit upon his own heart and those of his pupils; and so having done all in his power, leave it in the hands of his Heavenly Father. Can such a teacher fail to be successful? Impossible. St. John, 1862.

## A STEAMBOAT INCIDENT.
