The name of Bunyan is immortal. His character and writings will travel down through all coming ages, and be read till the end of time.

The historic scenes and events of his life are ever memorable. They are stamped with the impress of an abiding interest. His twelve years unjust imprisonment, and the efforts for his release by his heroic and devoted wife, will be held in perpetual remembrance.

One of the plates, beantifully engraved, which embellishes our present number, illustrates a touching scene in the life of Bunyan. He was in prison. His family were in want, and needed a father's care, and protection and sympathy. As a means of obtaining his release from prison, Bunyan wrote several petitions. His wife had, by his direction carried one petition to the house of Lords, and failed of her object. She was directed to apply to the Assize Court. She had applied twice to the judges of that high tribunal, and was denied her petition and repulsed. Lord Chief Justice Hale, an eminently kind hearted and Christian man, pitied her case, and seemed strongly inclined to grant her request. But the other judges, unpitying and cruel, objected and overruled the decision against her petition each time.

The seene in the plate is intended to show the heroic wife of Bunyan as she appeared the third time before the Assize Court. The audience chamber is filled to overflowing.
