To say that more than a majority of the rioters in every single place were Irish Roman Catholics, is much below what will not be disputed by any impartial observer. Not a few of the Roman Catholic pulpits of New York city on Sunday distinctly acknowledged the predominantly Irish character of the mob. It is the concurrent testimony of the proprietors of large manufacturing establishments, that it was the Irish Catholic part of their laborers, that foremost or alone manifested its sympathy with the movement. The committees that compelled or attempted to compel the cessation of labor consisted of Irish Catholics. Prominent in the list of the killed and arrested rioters are the Irish names.
