He could not see. How do you think he made up the pleasure of the deprived sense to himself? why, by sitting still and rubbing his fingers over a piece of silk velvet. It was his great delight-his chief sensuous pleasure. In any company it was a luxury if he could press his finger against any part of a velvet dress; if I had on a velvet waistcoat he would beg as a favour to be allowed to pass his finger over it; it communicated a pleasure to his whole frame; and what seems more wonderful, it communicated ideas and sensations to his mind, till at last, all things were tried by a sort of velvet standard-were reduced to the velvet principle; -velvet became in his mind his mode of judgment of men and things; the softness of his favorite substance harmonized well with the gentleness of his own mind; it was only his mode of expressing his love to God when speaking of his goodness to him-he said,

"Yes, he has placed me in a beautiful velvet world." Thus he regarded everything from his sense of touch. He was cut off from the images and figures and suggestions of the external world of sight; and so he referred everything to feeling. He had, too, a number of proverbs he was in the habit of bringing forth on various occasions.
