LIBERALITY OF CONVERTED PAGANS.

It is one of the most cheering features in missionary life that the converts contribute so freely to sustain Christian institutions among themselves, and to send the gospel to other heathen tribes. True faith in Christ makes the heart tender, sympathising, and charitable. Mr. Lennep, a missionary of the American Board at Tocat, Asia Minor, who recently lost his library by fire, writes of a contribution he had received from some African Converts, of whom he previously had no knowledge:-

"I must trespass upon your patience by quoting from one of the many letters of sympathy I have received. It is dated from Umvoti, South Africa, and written by Rev. A. Grout, our missionary among the Zulus, not long ago a wild and degraded race of savages, but now many of them civilised, Christianised, in full sympathy with the 'Universal Church,' and heirs of heaven. Notice that I never saw Brother Grout, or had any sort of personal relation with him. He says, 'Did you ever hear of the Zulus in Africa, and that they had missionaries among them? One Grout is there in that capacity, and I am the man. Our longitude is such, that about the time you close morning devotions we commence ours. Still so much latitude separate us, and the way of communication

is so circuitous, that we only heard of the fire which I

I told them they would remember that Tocat was the place where Henry Martyn died and was buried, of whom they had read something before. Now, I said, what a sad thing it is for a missionary, school and all, to be burned out! As many of you as would like to take up a collection, and send the avails to the unfortunate missionary at Tocat, may raise your hands, and up came every black hand in the house. And I herewith send the collection, one pound, five shillings and sixpence sterling. Now I wish you to understand that this collection was not taken up simply because I suggested it. I find the hearts of these Zulus, by nature and by grace, just like the hearts of other people. I seemed to see their hearts looking out through their eyes, the moment I spoke of missionaries burned out, and their hands went at once to their pockets. And some who were not on the occasion prepared for the contribution, said, "I will bring mine to-morrow;" and they did so voluntarily and cheerfully."
