EDITORIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

Beaver River, Yarmouth Co., N. S., Sept. 18, 1863. We left St. John on Thursday, at 8 o'clock, A. M., in the steamer "Emperor," and arrived at Digby a little before 1 o'clock, P. M. After a brief stay of an hour for rest and dinner, we took stage for this place, distance about fifty five miles, where we arrived a little after 2 o'clock, on Friday morning. We found an agreeable resting place at the house of Mr. Eleazer Raymond, who was expecting our arrival, and the hospitalities of whose family we are still enjoying, But little of interest came under our notice between St. John and this place. The trip to Digby was pleasant; although a fresh breeze was felt, the bay was not rough, and but few of the passengers inconvenienced by sea sickness. At Digby we met Bro. J. Noble, from Cornwallis, on his way with his daughter, to attend the Conference, and also some friends from Harmony, all bound for this place. Since our last visit to Digby, a new and substantial wharf has been built, which obviates the former great inconvenience of landing from the steamer in a small boat. Beyond this we observed but little change in the town of Digby. A fine new ship was just completed in the building yard of Mr. Jones, and was to be launched the afternoon we left there. From Digby to Weymouth, a distance of eighteen miles, the country affords so very interesting features. Weymouth seems to be a thriving village of some business, and is pleasantly situated. On the afternoon we passed through Weymouth, a tea meeting and bazaar were held in connection with the Methodist church, the object of which was to raise funds to repair their place of worship. While horses were changing, Brother Hartley and we availed ourselves of the opportunity of looking in upon the friends for a few minutes. The Rev. Mr. Taylor, Wesleyan Minister, who was present, recognized us, and very cordially greeted us, and pressed our taking tea with the friends, but our time would not allow our accepting the kind invitation. Soon after leaving Weymouth the evening closed in upon us, and we were prevented from seeing the country between that place and this.
