I presume your telegraphic despatches have already in such certificate. informed you of the raid into Pennsylvania, by a portion of the Confederate army, under General Lee. Although the administration at Washington had every | ARRIVAL OF THE CANADA OFF CAPE RACE. reason to except such an event, yet they have allowed the enemy to 'overrun many portions of that State without offering the slightest resistance. The inhabitants have been alarmed and scattered, property destroyed, public works ruined, and the whole Union disgraced through the imbecility and inaction of those whose duty it was to provide against such a contingency. Immediately after receipt of the news on Monday night, the Governor of New York called on the State Militia, to go to the relief of their sister State. On Tuesday evening (less than twenty four hours after they received the notice from their officers) the 7th, 13th, and 71st regiments reported ready for marching order, but they did not leave until Wednesday. Other regiments are preparing to follow, and there is no doubt but this State will be able, in the course of a week or ten days, to place ten thousand drilled men, many of whom have seen some active service, at the disposal of the General Government. The whole community has been moved as one man, and all appear willing and anxious to perform their duty in the defence of the country. The peace party is at a discount, and stocks were never known to decline so rapidly as did the influence of the copperheads on Tuesday last. The party feelings which existed only a few days since have disappeared as though all felt that union is strength, and that the interest of the nation demands that all petty political differences should be forgotten, and all work together in one grand effort to subdue the rebels, and so hasten the return of peace and prosperity to this (once) the I firmly believe that amongst the great mass of Americans their love of country is worthy of the heroes of the revolution, and that the failure of the North to administration, and not to want of support or action on the part of the people.
