The force of the rebels is variously estimated at from 250 to 400. Reliable parties place it at 300. Their every act during their stay in the city was characterized by the most cowardly barbarity. They entered the town on the gallop, firing into every house, and when the occupants appeared at the door they were shot down like dogs. Five bodies were burned to a crisp, and lay near the ruins of the Eldridge House. They could not be recognized.

Eighteen out of twenty-two unarmed coloured troops, camped south of the town, were murdered in their tents. Their bodies lay in the colored church when we arrived.
