EXTENT AND RESOURCES OF AUSTRALIA. - We find in an English paper a summary report of an address recently given in London, by the R. J. L. Poore, who has recently returned from Australia, after spending two years of missionary life there. We give an extract showing the extent and growth of that colony :

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Australia, he stated, was, for all practical purposes, as large as Europe, excluding the icy, regions of Siberia; and it was a remarkable fact that the country contained copper and coal and iron, as well as Already our countrymen had become widely spread over those colonies. To give his hearers some idea of the extent of those infant nations, he mentioned Australian colonies, and yet it is as large as the father :-United Kingdom, with Portugal added to it; South Australia and New South Wales were ten times as large; and Queensland twenty times. The coast line of the combined colonies gave an extent of more than three thousand miles. The rapid development of these countries was really marvellous. In 1851, when the gold was discovered in Victoria, Melbourne was a quiet colonial town, containing about 20,000 inhabitants, and the whole colony 70,000. There were now in that colony, exclusive of 26,000 Asiatics, chiefly Chinese, 520,000 English-speaking people. It was found in 1861 that there were in that year, in the whole colony, 10,000 deaths and 22,000 births, so that the increase, irrespective of immigration, was exceedingly rapid. Of the whole population of 520, 000 about 140,000 were below ten years of age; and nearly 200,000 colonial-born people. It would be apparent to every reflecting person that the spiritual needs of a country thus circumstanced were preent and constantly augmenting, lest the people should sink into a civilised barbarism. It could not be that such a country should be an object of indifference to Englishmen, irrespective of its mercantile importance. But in this latter respect it was a land whose prosperity must be of first rate concern to us. Over £20,000,000 worth of manufactured goods were imported there every year; and in return there are sent to England articles most essential to our commercial prosperity, gold, wool, and various minerals. Whilst regarded with self-interest by the trader, Mr. Poore urged that Australia should be contemplated by the Christian with the most tender concern and solicitude.
