Once the Bishop of Ely complained to Cardinal Wolsey that Master Latimer was saying things against the Church and its prelates. The Cardinal, in all England the most powerful subject, called for the preacher, and examined him; who gave such a good explanation of what he had said, that Wolsey gave him leave to preach anywhere throughout the realm, any bishop notwithstanding.

In 1530 he had the distinction of being made one of Henry VIII.'s chaplains. The king had heard and liked his powerful appeals. The post had its dangers for any honest man; for Henry had a habit of putting to death all who did not profess to agree with him in whatever was his belief of the moment. So many were burned that Latimer wrote him a letter of remonstrance; and the king, though he did not act upon it, allowed him to escape when the bishops cast him into prison.

Latimer was made a bishop himself in 1535; and laboured as diligently at his diocese as he ever had at his parish. After four years he found that he could not hold office under a king so cruel as Henry VIII., who had just published Six Articles of Religion, embracing most of the Romish errors; which, if a man did not believe, he must die by fire or the axe. "Henry began by persecuting Protestants for believing too little, and then Papists for believing too much; then Protestants again. One day, the grey head of a statesman like More, dying in the faith of Rome, rolled on the Tower-hill scaffold; on another, the stake was raised on the slopes of Windsor Castle, or in the bloody plains of Smithfield, for some poor weaver or apprentice, who had sneered at the mystic wafer, crying out to the priest in the act of lifting up the host, "Don't let him fall !"
