

REACHED THE SOUTH.—Late Confederate newspapers which reached us, present a terrible picture of affairs in that portion of Louisiana within the lines of Jeff. Davis's armies. The destruction of the people is represented as extreme, and starvation is said to be rampant among them. The people are said to be mentioned for this is the absolute worthlessness of which Rebel money has been reduced. Society is evidently in a most disorganized condition in that region, as, thieves, plundering, pilfering, and anarchy, are the order of the day.
 The Richmond *Examiner* of the 2d inst. has de-
 dated near Plymouth, N. C., Oct. 31 which says:—
 After three days' hard fighting the enemy passed up Middle river and came down Roanoke river. Gen. Baker fought until the enemy's gunboats passed on, and then he retreated to the safety of the harbor. An evacuation was then ordered, which was accom-
 plished under some shelling.
 By the above it appears that the Union forces went up a channel which took them above Plymouth, and then down the river to the lower channel, com-
 manding the rear of that place. The Richmond *Journal* displays considerable anxiety about the anti-
 cipated naval attack on that place.
 The Richmond *Examiner* of the 3d inst. has Jacksonville, Ala., advices of the 27th ult., stating that the Florida rebels had a rendezvous near the 25th had completed the crossing of the Tennessee river. The rebels had secured before crossing some 8,000 fine bees. The track from Dalton had been torn up by Hood for thirty-five miles, and had been in three hundred yards of Resaca.
 The Richmond *Examiner* of the 4th, learns from Gen. Kilpatrick, in an attack on Wheeler's cavalry protecting Hood's rear, has been supplied, also that a cavalry raid had been made on Talladega by the Yankees.
 Beauregard left Jacksonville soon after the army to take command in the field.
 The authorities of Mobile have offered the enro-
 ment of negroes.
 The Richmond *Examiner* of the 3d inst. says:—
 "The Northern cities are swarming with refugees from the District of Columbia, by New York, where Butler and Knox, who robbed the rebel treasury of about a million dollars, are not located."
 CAPTURE OF THE FLORIDA.—The following is the official and only account of the Florida's capture that has yet been received:—
 St. Thomas, West India Islands, 3d Oct.
 To Hon. Gideon Wells via Boston, Nov. 8.
 SIR.—I have the honor to report the arrival here this ship, with the rebel steamer Florida in company with the British brig, the *redunder*, which was captured about 3 o'clock on the morning of the 7th October, in the Bay of San Salvador, Brazil, by the officers and crew of this little vessel without loss of life.
 Five of the officers, including her commander, the remainder of her crew, were ashore.
 The Richmond *Examiner* of the 3d inst. says:—
 "The Florida was a mizzen mast and main yard carried away, and her bulwarks cut down. The vessel sustained no injury. A detailed report will be handed you by Paymaster W. W. Williams.

 PRICES IN THE RICHMOND MARKETS.
 [Correspondence of the Richmond Dispatch, Nov. 1.]
 Deeming it to be the duty of every one in the days of extortion to do what may be done to those who are victimized, we have been obliged to gain I desire to call attention to the fact that some vegetables can be bought at the commission stores for about one-third of the prices demanded in the market houses. For instance, Irish potatoes are bought at 42¢ per bushel from the commission stores, while in the market houses they are demanded—equal to \$64 to \$80 per bushel. Sp. potatoes, for which \$14 a peck (\$56 a bushel) charged at the markets, can be had of the merchants at \$30 a bushel—a difference of \$26 on the bushel.
 THE ST. ALBANS RAIDERS.
 The application for a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of the robbers and murderers who on the late raid into St. Albans from the Canada was based on the ground that the proceedings under Judge Counsel were illegal, in that he had exercised his powers of jurisdiction, and that the capture was irregular. These points were adroitly and argued by the prisoners' counsel, but no reply made by the prosecution. The Montreal correspond of the St. Albans *Moniteur* reports the decision of the Court as follows:—
 "The president of the Court, Aylwin, clearly stated his opinion on all the points raised, and concluded with the expression, 'the motion for a writ of habeas corpus is perfectly rejected.' Judges Mondet and Drummond, each in a clear and unequivocal manner, expressing their dissent from the opinion of the presiding judge. Judge Mon-
 dret was particularly strong and emphatic in expressing the fixed and decided determination of the Court to protect to the utmost the rights of the accused, and the whole power of the law. The rights of the community, also were of great importance. The rights of the counsel would strictly regard. The independence of the crown, and of the people alike, and would neither be influenced by power by popular opinion or fear. It would do in the stance its entire duty to prisoners, to the law, and to the sovereignty of law.  BUFFALO, NOV. 5.—It is reliably ascertained the rebels have purchased the propeller George, at the wharf of the Erie canal, and are now on the Canadian shore for the purpose of sinking the steamer Michigan, and for piraticalursions generally on the coast. We are prepared for her here.
 STATISTICS OF THE CROP OF THE UNITED STATES FOR 1864.
 The crop circular just issued by the Commissioner of Agriculture, shows that the whole crop of 1864, compared with the crop of 1863, was an increase, a decrease from the product of last year, eighteen millions, and a decrease from the product of 1862 of twenty million bushels.
 The rye crop of the present year amounted to twenty million bushels, an increase of two million bushels over the products of last year and a decrease of three million from the products of 1862.
 The barley crop of the present year amounted to eleven million bushels, being a decrease from the product of 1863 of one million bushels, and an increase from the product of 1862 of two million bushels.
 The oat crop of the present year amounts to hundred and seventy seven million bushels, an increase over the products of last year of four million bushels, and an increase over the product of 1862 of a million bushels.
 The corn crop of the present year amounted to eighty million tons, a decrease from last year of two million tons, and a decrease from the product of 1862 of two million five hundred and sand tons.
 The corn crop of the present year amounted to 900,000 bushels, an increase over the product of last year of 79,000,000 bushels, and a decrease from the product of 1862 of 55,000,000 bushels.
 The tobacco crop of the present year amounted to 197,500 pounds, a decrease from the product of 1863 of 30,000 pounds, and an increase from the product of 1862 of 30,000 pounds.
 The sugar crop of the present year amounted to 19,000,000 bushels, a decrease from the product of last year of 2,000,000, and about equal crop of 1862.
 The cotton crop of the present year amounted to 95,000,000 bushels, a decrease of 5,000,000 from the product of 1863, and a decrease of 1,000 bushels from the product of 1862.
