Do not think that I purpose to deliver an indiscriminate tirade of abuse against this practice. I wish to speak moderately, and to give the result of my reflections founded upon much observation.

I do not deny that there are many temperaments that seem to be able to use tobacco all their life long with comparatively little inconvenience-to themselves. I do not mean that every young man who addicts himself to chewing or smoking will of necessity take on other vices, or let this habit run to excess. But we are a nervous people. · Everything in the economy of our society tends to develope the brain and the nervous system unduly. Now, as a matter of fact, it is true that among such a people smoking is apt to lead to thirst and drinking. Not always, not necessarily ; but frequently and naturally. 
