GIFT ENTERPRISES.

We published, a short time since, an expose of these frequent attempts at swindling the public by means of 'gift enterprises, lotteries,' &c. No sooner, however, is one system exposed than another appears in a different form. The most persistent is the 'Book' swindle, which seems to have a certain hold upon the public, and to escape legal indictment by sailing close to the wind. The swindle consists in advertising good books at certain rates, with the promise that every purchaser will receive with the book a chance for jewelry, gold and silver watches, &c. It is often the case that the book advertised is slow of sale, and is purchased by the projector of the enterprise at low rates, and offered in the "enterprises" at the published price, together with the chance.
