The counsel for the American Government demanded under the extradition treaty that the prisoners be sent to New York for trial. The defendants claim to have been justified in their course by written authority from Confederate officials. The Magistrates remanded the case until the 4th of March.

COPENBAGEN, Feb. 26 .- The Minister of War has proposed to the King to dismiss Gen. De Meza from the army. The Prussians were still at Kolding yesterday. Both Houses of the Rigsraad to-day adopted almost unanimously an address to the King in favor of the energetic prosecution of the war and the maintainance of the union with Schleswig.

The Duke of Augustenburg, in reply to an important deputation from all parts of Schleswig, declared his intention never to surrender his rights. It is confirmed that France assents to the conference, though not in a very earnest spirit.

The defences of Duppel are thus described :-

"The defences of Duppel consist of ten separate formidable earthworks, each commanding the others till they rise to the very summit of the hill dominat ing the Alse: Sound, the right wing resting on that strait, and the left extending to the bay on the south, known as the Benningbo. The sides of these intrenchments are twenty-feet high, and are moreover protected by a dry ditch twelve feet deep and twenty feet wide, well defended by palisades of heavy timber. The works are armed with a hundred guns in position, which can sweep the country in the front as far as the village of Vanderup, while the flanks are pro artillery erected on the Island of Alsen, as well as by the twelve gunboats stationed in the Sound. The bridge across is guarded by a double tete-de pont, so skilfully arranged that if one of them be taken the fire the Sound is very deep and clear, varying from eight cavalry horses -in all 185,515, at \$125 cach, making to thirty fathons in depth, fully admitting the largest \$23,189,375. But owing to the increase of the army, harassed in their rear on their march to the north, the allies must either take this position or else blockade it on the land side, which can only be done by the presence of a very large army corps forming a strong cordon across the whole of the peninsula, which at that place is nearly eight miles wide."

COPENHAGEN, FEB. 21 .- The following address to King Christian is being circulated for signature among the citizens of this capital, ; and will be presented in a few days :-

"Most Gracious King-convinced that only one desire, the salvation and welfare of the country, animates the people in these serious times, and persuaded that this is only to be attained by union and concord, we the undersigned citizens of Copenhagen feel the necessity of expressing to your Majesty our confidence and our devotion. Our beloved country is in great! danger. The order of succession in the monarchy, according with right and history, which had obtained the recognition of all Europe, has been treacherously attacket, and we see with sorrow that the European Powers abstain from powerful interference to prevent revolt and lust for conquest infringing the sanctity of solemn treaties. The Danish people has seen with lively indignation the sovereignty of the Crown and the right of free selection of their Government by the people simultaneously assailed. Abandoned to herself slone, Denmark has been forced to give ground before a far more numerous enemy, and our valiant army is now only able to detend a small portion of the beloved soil of Schleswig against foreign foes. "Most Gracious King-In such grave times of
