Now the annual expenditure is \$15,000, and still larger accommodations are ceived. needed. Many pious students are begging admission, churches are importuning for pastors from thence, and a wide field of labor is opening before them.

The number of pastors sent out from the institution already is thirty-eight, and marked success has at tended their labors in England, Ireland, Scotland, Newfoundland, and Australia. One within one year had baptized seventy-six persons; and received in all one hundred and twenty-seven to the membership of his church. Another in three years had baptized one hundred and seventy-seven; another in two years and a half one hundred and ten, eighty of whom had found Christ under his preaching. And these are but a few of the results of this blessed work .- Morning Star.

THE NEW GOVERNOR-GENERAL OF INDIA. The following sketch of the parentage and history of the man who now rules the wide and important region of Hindestan and the neighboring countries, will be read with interest:

More than half a century ago the affairs of a worthy draper in the town of Coloraine, in the county of Londonderry, got embarrassed. He sent his son, who assisted him in the business, to Manchester and Leeds to arrange with his creditors. The young man was harshiy received; and, after having failed to effect a settlement, arrived at Liverpool on his way home. His honorable spirit was lacerated by the treatment he had met with, and, dreading still more the disgrace and reproach he expected to encounter on his return to his native town, he, in a fit of desperation, enlisted as a private soldier. The young draper's regiment was ordered out to India, where his good conduct soon brought him into notice, and the excellent education he had received paved the way for his promotion. He rose step by step until he reached the rank of colonel. He served his country with honor, and in course of time gave two sons to the military service, having first given them to the Lord, and imbued their youthful minds with Christian principles. Their valor and military accomplishments shed lustre on that earnest piety soldiers to whom we refer were Sir John Lawrence, now the Governor General of India, and the late Sir Henry Lawrence, known as the savior of Lucknow. Both of them have done honor and good service to the cross of the Lord Jesus.
