So much for the liquor. Now for the ale. In 551 barrels of ale there are 141,056 pints. This sold at 5 cents a pint, would amount to \$7052,80. As ale drinking is considered a lower form of intemperance than wine drinking, etc., we will put this sum in part to a lower, but none the less worthy service. We will pay a clergyman to preach to the 160 inmates of the county almshouse, \$1000; 2 teachers for the children there, \$250 each, \$500; 15 poor students in the academy \$300 each, \$45,000; 2 students in a Theological Seminary, 525, \$1050; and leave a balance of \$2 80 in the treasury.
