From Special Telegram to "Morning News." HAMPTON, Dec. 15th, 11 P. M. Confederate Meeting in Factory attended by about 250 persons. Isaac Raymond, Esq, was called to the chair, and in brief and pertinent remarks introduced

the speakers. Mr. Gray spoke first and addressed himself, to the constitutional portion of the question, and explained its varied features. He showed advantage of Federal system of Union in way agreed upon over system of Legislative Union which finds favor in some quarters, and over Commercial Union. Spoke of advantages likely to result to manufacturies from abrogation of Tariffs and opening of extended market to the Pro vince by construction of Intercolonial Railway, towards which we contribute so little, and from which we will gain so much.
