One of the pirates, who was a kind of ringleader, and could speak English,-though showing no compunction before, -seems to have had an unaccountable desire to spare the lives of the mate and carpenter; and it is to him the mate ascribes his being permitted to reach the land.

Once there, be, an Englishman, communicates the tale of blood to the authorities, the carpenter confirms the narrative, - the men are all apprehended, -sent to England for trial, and by the testimony of these witnesses, the hideous transactions that took place in the middle of the Atlantic ocean are brought to light, and the murderers convicted and hung.

How swiftly did the punishment follow the deed. Far away from land, in the solitude of the great deep, the murders were planned and carried out, and by men all aliens and foreigners, only one of whom could speak a word of English. The ship was then navigated to a Spanish colony, remote from any English possession, all her papers having been destroyed, and finally sunk before reaching land. Yet but a few months afterwards, we find the men brought to trial in England, in the very port from whence they had sailed under the hapless captain, and there, after fair trial, having had the advocacy of able counsel, and the assistance of interpreters, all the facts are brought to light, and upon the clearest evidence they are condemned - Montreal Witness
