

ASSESSMENT FOR SCHOOLS.—We noticed a couple of weeks since that Inspector Freeze had prepared a paper on assessment for schools, which was read before the Municipality of Carleton County. We find the following relative to the matter in a recent number of the *Sentinel*:—

The Warden read a paper on Education from R. C. Freeze, when it was moved by Mr. Simpson, seconded by Mr. Hayward, *Whereas* in the opinion of this Council, the subject of Education is one of the first importance, and further that Assessment for the support of schools would remove many of the existing evils now operating against the successful working of the School system in this County, therefore *Resolved*, that the paper touching the matter now before the Board be forwarded to the publishers of the *Carleton Sentinel* and *Woodstock Advertiser*, with a request to publish the same; and further *Resolved*, that the members of this Board do, so far as practicable, bring this matter before the notice of rate payers in their respective Parishes forthwith, with a view to test the opinion of the electors on the question at the next election of Councillors; and further *Resolved*, that the thanks of this Council be due to R. C. Freeze, Esq., Inspector of Schools, and that the Warden be instructed to convey to him this expression of the Board for the interest he has manifested in bringing this matter before the notice of this Municipality. The Resolution passed unanimously.

At a Meeting of the Carleton County Teacher's Institute, held in Woodstock, on the 10th inst., the following resolutions were adopted relative to assessment for the support of schools:—

Whereas the Municipal Council of this County at their late meeting, gave an expression in favor of assessing the County for the support of the Schools; and *Whereas* the question is likely soon to be left to the people of the County for their decision, therefore *Resolved*, that this Society fully approve of the principle, inasmuch as the interests of Education will be much promoted by its adoption, as manifest from the following, and many other reasons that might easily be assigned:

1. It will add largely to the number of Schools, and we believe, greatly increase their average attendance; while it will bring a much larger Provincial Grant to this County without any additional cost to the people.

2. It will cause a much more regular attendance of pupils, and hence tend to bring them to the schools; while it will bring a much larger Provincial Grant to this County without any additional cost to the people.

3. It will obviate many local prejudices which now arise by establishing Schools under the present system, at the same time it will lighten the burden of School support on the poorer classes of society, and give *Free Schools* to all.

The correspondent of the London Times at Biarritz notices discovery of reported plot against the Emperor, on his way to San Sebastian or to his return to Bayonne. The parties concerned were Italians, including a brother or cousin of Orsini's. Precautionary measures were taken, and the Queen of Spain and her suite accompanied the Emperor as he passed the railroad station, notwithstanding the night, in order she might share any risk run by her guests.

Cholera had increased so much at Marseilles that the Mayor summoned a meeting of physicians to consider the matter.

Weekly returns of Bank of France show a decrease in cash of four and a half millions of francs. Bourse on 15th closed flat, 67.40.

Gastin Convention Associated Russian Government sent a circular to its diplomatic agents respecting the position of the Russian Empire in the case of the English and French Governments. It further asserted, that England, France and Russia long since exchanged views relative to the decision, that perfect agreement exists in their views upon the above Convention, General von Manteuffel as the representative of Prussia in Schleswig, and Field Marshal von Goltz as representative of Austria in Holstein, respectively assumed the administration of affairs in the Duchies on 15th, and issued proclamations calling on inhabitants to maintain public order and loyalty, and promising them justice and liberty.

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Province of New Brunswick for the line from St. John to the boundary of Maine, where it is to connect with the line from Bangor to Bangor. A despatch from Buffalo says that the propeller Buckeye, from Ogdensburg for the Upper Lakes with a cargo of merchandise, struck a rock and sank in 50 feet of water in the river St. Lawrence on Sunday morning. Five lives lost. No other particulars.

The *Herald's* Washington despatch says, there is a great probability that the balance of the \$25,000,000 loan which amounts to \$27,000,000, will be called for. Gold 143½.

A dinner was given at the Parker House last evening to Mr. Cunard, M. P., of London, by several of our distinguished citizens. He leaves for home in the Asia to-morrow.

The National Bank of Concord, Mass., was robbed on Monday of \$800,000, principally United States securities. A reward of \$20,000 is offered for the arrest of the robbers.
