THE ASSASSIN SHOT.

Sergeant Boston Corbett, Co. L., Sixteenth New York Cavalry, bad a sight of Booth through the crack, and drawing his cavalry six-shooter, fired. Booth fell over, holding in each hand a six-barreled revolver. Detectives Conger and Baker and Lieutenant Dougherty and Sergeant Corbett rushed into the barn and brought Booth out. The ball had cotered the back of his neck and passed entirely through his head. He was still conscious. Detective Baker laid him on the ground, and held his head in his lap.

"It's all up now; I am gone," he faintly articulated. Booth did not deay killing the President, but showed no sign of repentance. To Lieutenant Dougherty, he said : " Teil my mother, I died in defence of my country."
