The tyrant of half a nation, dislodged from his throne, a fugitive through his own realm, a price set upon his head, by misfortune to a last great opportunity for proving to the world his greatness of soul, closes his career with such moral weakness that, except for the ludicrousness of the final situation, his fate would excite contempt so easily mingled with pity.

The question is, does it not go to men's lips, what shall be the punishment? Shall he be tried for treason? Shall he be tried for inhuman treatment of prisoners? Shall he be tried for assassination? Or shall he be tried for all these crimes? But, on whatever charge he may be tried, let his trial be dignified, impassioned, and impartial, and after the sentence, let the death-penalty be solemnly executed. Oppose us as we are to capital punishment, and hopeful that the nation will one day abolish the scaffold, yet since the American people have chosen to punish ordinary culprits with hanging, how shall they permit the greatest of criminals to go free? We build our argument upon this rock: If the Government shall not hang Jefferson Davis, then let it never hang another man while the world stands.

BOSTON, June 13.

A Washington despatch says Prof. McHenry has been cleared of all prisoners of every kind, the political prisoners being pardoned. He has arrived here from Morehead City, N.C., and reported great suffering among the people of the Eastern portion of that State.

Several ex rebel Congressmen from Virginia have notified Governor Pierpont of their determination to support him with secession.

Judge Underwood, of the Eastern Section of Virginia, is in Washington in consultation with the Attorney General with regard to the indictment of Lee, Corse, Ewell, Longstreet, ex-Governors Smith and Leitcher, and others, for treason.

Attorney General Speed has issued a circular relating to special applications for pardons under the Amnesty Proclamation, directing that all applicants must be accompanied by the original oath prescribed in the President's proclamation, as taken or subscribed by the applicant before an officer competent to administer such oath.

It is rumored that John Mitchell has also been indicted for treason.

A tremendous explosion of loose powder and fixed ammunition took place in Chattanooga, 10th inst., destroying property valued at a quarter of a million of dollars.

President Johnson has appointed Judge Sharkey Provisional Governor of Mississippi.

President has issued a proclamation removing all restrictions on trade throughout the States late in insurrection, except what relate to munitions of War.
