her subjects from injuring her protege. Washington Cabinet probably has no desire this moment to be on bad terms with this country, and will, no doubt, act prudently in this affair. Language and tone of France are what may be called energetic. It may not be literally correct as I mention, but is substantially so.

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On the 8th, in the Corps Legislatif, Jules Favre made a speech strongly condemning Mexican Expedition. He maintained that the position of Maximilian was precarious, and apprehended conflict with America.

M. Chaix D'Estrange demonstrated in reply that position of Maximilian was in no way precarious, and pointed out progress made in Mexico. The effective strength of Expeditionary Corps, he said, did not exceed 26,000 men. Relative to apprehensions of conflict with America, M. Chaix D'Estrange adverted to pacific expressions of Lincoln just before his death, which had become a political testament that will be executed by those whom Lincoln no longer governs, but whom his memory should inspire. The United States, continued the speaker, only think of consoling widows and orphans, and do not think of shedding blood on their frontiers.

E.press had received a letter written by the President of the United States to Emperor in reply to Imperial letter recalling Mercier.

Text of despatch of May 22nd, addressed to Bigelow by French department at Washington, is published. It expressed grateful memory preserved by Government and people of the United States of sentiments expressed by Emperor, Senate, and Corps Legislatif, on assassination of Lincoln. It reverts also to old friendship existing between two nations, a friendship says the Minister which is cordially reciprocated on our side.

Permission being granted, he related the story of Galileo who denounced his own theory of the earth's motion around the sun at the command of the Pope, but, rising from his knees, exclaimed, "It moves yet, it moves yet;" and so said he, should take the oath of allegiance to the Confederate States, I should in my heart render allegiance to the Union
