All our trade will then be destroyed by their protective duties, and in order to meet them we must tax our own consumers and defend our coasts and fisheries from the tax raised upon our disunited strength. SCHOONER "HALATIA" WATERLOGGED AND ALL HANDS SUPPOSED LOST. - The schooner Halatia, 81 tons register, of this port, with a cargo of 74,000 feet of lumber, cleared by G. N. Robinson on the 10th February last, and sailed on the day following for Matamoras, was picked up yesterday at 4 P. M., by the Digby packet Digby, about fifty miles from the Nova Scotia coast, abandoned and waterlogged, and a complete wreck. We are informed that the service of the telegraph fine of the Indian Government between Fae, at the frontiers of India, is performed by the best English signallers, and may be fully relied on; but that it will probably be some time before the administration CANADA AND THE MARITIME PROVINCES .- A writer of the line through the Turkish dominions can be so organised as to render that part of the communication equally reliable. In the former part of the line from Persia to India, all the difficulties that have to be overcome are the natural ones of communicating along the sea coast, from station to station; but in that part of the Turkish dominions through which the line passes, and especially in the lower part of the valleys of the Euphrates and the Tigris, the country is so unsettled, and so continually disturbed by the contests between the Arabs and the Turks, as to render it much more difficult to keep open the communications. Fortunately the Turkish Government itself has a very strong interest in keeping open the line from Constantinople to Bagdad; and from the latter point to the Persian Gulf the line may possibly be kept open by placing it under the protection of the Arabs chiefs, who are the real governors of that district. In one way or other we have no doubt that seaports. Her union with the States would complete the line will be maintained and made to work satis-

factorily. scarcely be anything to excel the establishment of this method of communication from England to India -a distance of some 5000 to 6000 miles, even by the almost direct line followed by the telegraphic wire. In a few weeks the line from England to Kurrachee will be completely united with all the telegraphic lines in India, and before many years have elapsed it will be still further extended, so as to communicate with the Indian Archipelago, China, and even with Australia and New Zealand. This is the first great step towards the establishment of telegraphic communication between all the principal nations of Europe, Asia, and Australasia, who form nearly three-fourths of the whole human race,

Nothing but the great influence which England possesses in Turkey and Persia could have rendered t possible to procure the concurrence of the Governments of those countries in the carrying out of such a scheme of communication, and it will no doubt require a steady exercise of British influence to keep the communication open through those countries. Fortunately the Turkish Government believes, and has reason to believe, that the British Government is it best friend, and its only reliable protector against Russian and other aggression, and it will no doubt do everything in its power to maintain a means of communication which is alike valuable to itself and to its most powerful and faithful ally.

When we consider how great and intimate are the interests, both political and commercial, which Engnow, by the application of the most extraordinary discovery of modern times, it has been reduced to hours.
