One fact which deserves notice, is the appearance of the cholera in several provinces of Italy. This epidemic has made here and there frightful ravages, because the government of this country have taken no care of the health of the lower classes. Their dwellings are unhealthy, and excessive uncleanliness increase the dreadful effects of the plague. The cholera now rages in the city of Naples, and threatens to spread throughout the kingdom of the Two Sicilies.

The Ultramontanes pretend that this is a judgment of God, because Victor Emanuel has invaded a portion of the Pontifical domains. They add that Rome and the adjacent cantons have been spared by the blessings of Providence, and hence, they conclude that the Lord has declared himself in favor of

The financial state of Italy is far from satisfactory. In spite of the large loans which have been contracted for some years past, the treasury is empty, and the deficiency increases. This is not surprising. Italy has been obliged to support a large army, so as to be always ready to resist the attacks of Austria, The removal of the capital from Turin to Florence has also cost enormous sums. A large portion of the population is poor, and cannot pay promptly the public taxes. Agriculture and manufactures languish. These and other similar causes account for the deficiency in the finances of the State.
