Afterwards, when St. Paul was working zealously in Christ's cause, and the Jews were angry and "watched the gates, day and night, to kill him," the "disciples took him by night, and let him down by the wall in a basket." This point in the wall of the city is shown yet; it is to the south of the city near one of the gates. During the massacre, of which I have told you, many persons were let down from windows by the walls in the same way.

The worder of Damascus is, that it has kept its youth and beauty so unchanged for over 4,000 years, while other mighty cities have gone to ruin and decay. And yet, dear young readers, the large cemeteries on the borders of the city, filled with graves, speak to us solemnly of all the generations of people who have lived and enjoyed these beauties, and at last been compelled to yield them all up at the call of death! Blessed were those among them who had a hope, through Christ, of a more beautiful Home, whose fountains flow from the "pure river of water of life," whose trees never fade, and whose temple is "the Lord God, and the Lamb!"
