The business was converted in August last into a limited liability, with a nominal capital of five millions sterling, of which a million and a half was paid up. The liabilities are stated at ten to twelve million

pounds sterling. The break down is attributed to heavy speculative sales of shares which forced them down from ten premium to a discount. Depositors then began to get alarmed, and the drain on the 10th was very severe. Application for assistance was made to the Bank of England, but the Governors declined to grant any, on the ground that it would be in vain, in a crisis like the present, to assist one establishment unless they were prepared to help other applications as well. It was too late to make a call on shareholders or take other steps, and the doors of the establishment were consequently closed.
