THE CHAINED BOOK. WRITTEN FOR THE YOUNG.

Many years ago, when books were scarce, and so very costly that none but the rich could have a library, there was in the churches in different parts of England a large volume fastened by a chain to a desk. This volume the people were allowed to use, but not to take away. Sometimes a crowd would be collected about the desk, listening with great attention to one of their number as he read to them from this chained volume. This book was the Bible, and all the opportunity which the people had of its contents, except when the Scriptures were used in the services of public worship, was to go up to the church and read or hear others read from this imprisoned work. How different is it now ! Bibles are so numerous and so cheap, that not only every family, but everyfended me. individual who knows how to read, may possess one if he desires. There is danger that, because the Bible is now a common book, and is everywhere met with, its preciousness may be undervalued. Because you see it at home, at your neighbor's at your Sunday-school, and perhaps at your week-day school, it may appear to you so common that you may forget its importance. Have you ever thought, children, that those blessings which are the most common are the most valuable ? They are, and I can prove it to you. There is water ; how abundant it is. It trickles down in numberless rivulets from the mountain's side; it gushes up in thousands and tens of thousands of springs from the bosom of the earth ; it flows grandly along in mighty rivers, or is collected together so as to form large and magnificent lakes. Yet is it not one of our most important gifts ? Could we do without it? Think too of the light; how common is that also. It fills the valleys, it covers the hills, it rushes into our dwellings, it flows over the wide ocean, and paints all the different objects of nature with the various colors they display. Without it everything would be wrapped in the blackness of darkness, and we should all have to grope our way as if we were blind. Eyes would be of no use, if there were no light Think of the air; that is abundant also. It remains with us after the light has departed. Night and day it envelopes the whole world, filling all the streets, stores, shops, churches, and dwellings with its blessed influence. There was a necessity for this. We should continue to live for a time even if we had no light; but we could not live a moment without air. You see now how very common are water, hight, and air, and you see also how necessary they are to human life and happiness. Does not this prove that our most common blessings are the most important? Just so it is with the Scriptures. They are now numerous, and are scattered everywhere. But as you do not undervalue water, light, and air, because of their abundance, so you should be careful to think none the less of the Scriptures because they are common; The Bible is one of the greatest blessings our heavenly Father has given us. I have seen men by the road-side, having in their hands heavy hatumers. Before them was a pile of large stones. These they would take. one by one, strike them with their hammers, and break them into small pieces. 
