The Bible is said to be like a sword. That is a remarkable passage in the fourth chapter of Hebrews and twelfth verse. It reads thus: "The word of God is quick and powerful, and sharper than any one in heaven." two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit and of the joints and marrow,

When Stephen preached to the Jews his great sermon, of which there is an account in the seventh chapter of Acts, he wielded this wonderful two-edged | death, and secure you at length a crown in heaven. sword with such skill and effect, that the Jews were cut to the heart. He wounded them with its keen. sharp edge; that is to say, he preached the truths of the Bible with such plainness and pungency as made them feel very unhappy, so that they gnashed on him with their teeth. And when Peter preached on the day of Pentecost, he used this same remarkable weapon, and with such powerful effect, that his hearers were pricked in the heart, and cried out, " Men and brethren, what shall we do?"

Speaking of the Bible as a sword reminds me of the following interesting incident. When a king of Great Britain was crowned it used to be the custom to present him with three swords, to signify that he was the appointed king over three countries, England, Scotland, and Ireland. On one occasion, when a young king was crowned, after these three significant weapons were given him to remind him that he was the appointed defender of a threefold empire, he said, "I want one sword yet;" and when asked what that one was, he replied, "The sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." That was a wise reply, for the Bible was a more important weapon for him to use than all his other three swords together. It would enable him to resist and overcome numerous spiritual enemies on whom his other swords could produce no effect.

It is just as important to you, my young reader. You are surrounded with enemies. All the temptations, the sins, and the foolish and wicked pleasures of the world are your enemies. Evil men and children who try to lead you astray, and Satan who goeth about like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour, are your enemies. If now you become acquainted with the truths of the Bible, and follow their teachings, you will be assisted in resisting these temptations, and thus will overcome your spiritual adversaries.

Let me recommend to you the example of the Psalmist, who said, "Thy word have I hid in my heart, that I might not sin against thee." He did not do as some people, who "hide" the Bible in their closet, their drawer, or down deep in their trunk, whistling. where they seldom see it. No, he hid it in his heart. He read it; he loved it; he committed it to memory; he caught the spirit of it, and obeyed it. And all this he did that he might not sin against God. In like manner, if you desire to avoid sinning against God, you must make yourself familiar with the Scriptures. Study them; learn them by heart, and follow their instructions; then will you experience the truth asserted in another verse of the Psalms: "Great peace have they which love thy law, and nothing shall offend them."

The Bible is not only a sword, it is also a shield. Sometimes it has been the means of saving both the bodies and the souls of men. Here is one interesting

When the great Oliver Cromwell had command of the British army, he ordered all the soldiers to earry a Bible in their pockets. A wild, wicked young man, who had run away from his employers in London, enlisted as a soldier, in order to share in the pleasures and plunder of the army. He was obliged to carry a Bible in his pocket, although he had no regard for its contents.

One day he went with his company and made an attack upon a fortress, and returned to the camp unhurt. When preparing himself for bed, as he drew the Bible from his pocket, his attention was attracted by a hole in the cover. As there was no hole there when he put the Bible in his pocket, he was curious to know what had produced it. He carefully opened its leaves, and to his surprise he found in it a bullet safely lodged. The ball had been fired when he made the attack upon the fortress, and had struck right against the pocket where he carried the Bible. The Bible received the ball which would otherwise have gone into his body. He then examined the book to see how far into it the ball had gone, and found that it had penetrated as far as the twelfth chapter of Ecclesiastics, and had lodged against this verse, which was singularly appropriate to him: "Rejoice, Oh young man, in thy youth, and let thy heart cheer thee in the days of thy youth, and walk in the ways of thy heart, and in the sight of thine eyes: but know thou that for all these things God will bring thee into judgment." This solemn passage awakened him to a sense of his condition. It was like the voice of God speaking to him amid the roar of battle, reminding him that he was on his way to the judgment. He became anxious. He earnestly sought forgiveness. He was hopefully converted to Christ, and was permitted to live many years afterwards, to prove by a Christian life the reality of his change. It was in this way that the Bible became to him a double shield, and protected both his body and his soul from death.
