THE QUEEN'S PROCLAMATION.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed on the 29th day of March, 1867, in the 30th year of our reign, intituled an Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and the Government thereof, and for purposes connected therewith, after divers recitals, it is enacted that "it shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Most Honble. Privy Council, to declare, by proclamation, that on and after a day therein appointed, not being more than six months after the passing of this Act, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall form and be one Dominion under the name of Canada, and on and after that day those three Provinces shall form and be one Dominion under that name accordingly;" and it is thereby forther enacted that such " persons shall be first summoned to the Senate as the Queen by warrant, under Her Majesty's Royal sign manual, thinks fit to approve, and their names shall be inserted in the Queen's Proclamation of Union." We therefore, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, have thought fit to issue this our Royal Proclamation, and we do ordain, declare and command that on and after the first day of July, 1867, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shall form and be one Dominion under the name of Canada:

And we do further ordain and declare that the persons whose names are herein inserted and set forth are the persons of whom we have by warrant under our Royal sign manual thought fit to approve as the persons who shall be first summoned to the Senate

### BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

London, June 1-A despatch from Wolf's News Agency, dated at Berlin to-day, reports that the Prussian Cabinet and the Government of the Czar have come to an understanding on the Eastern question, and that the policy of these Governments in the East will hereafter be identical.

Losdon, June 2. - Despatches from Constantinople report that the Sublime Porte has consented to entrust the solution of the Cretan question to a commission of European powers.

St. Petersburg, June 2.—The Imperial Government has issued a proclamation extending a general amnesty to the Poles engaged in the late insurrection in Russian Poland.

Paris, June 2 .- The Emperor of Russia and his two sons arrived in this city at 4 o'clock this afteroon. The Emperor Napoleon, accompanied by the Marshals of the Empire and the Ministers of his Cabinet, received the visitors and conducted them to the Palace of the Tuilleries. The railroad depot, the Tuilleries, and the streets through which the cavalcade passed, were profusely decorated with flags. Immense crowds of spectators lined the route of the procession, and great enthusiasm was manifested by the populace.

YOKHAMA, JAPAN, April 26. - The Foreign Ministers have accepted the Tycoon's invitation to visit him at Osaca. The French, English and Dutch Ministers have already gone with their combined naval force of six vessels. The American Minister departs to-morrow with the Shenandoah and Wyoming. The visit is purely social, and is to last one month. The Tycoon has made preparations for the reception and entertainment with great pomp.
